It. is certain that the Porto Rico bill will have to be amended to get it through the Senate. It is proposed, and the proposal is likely to go that all goods from the United States shall be admitted to Porto Rico free of duty. It is also proposed that the 15 per cent duty Porto Rican products shipped to the United States shall be still further lowered, but the chances are against that proposition going through. Those who were instrumental in putting the bill through the House talk as though they didn't care particularly how the bill was ended, so long as the principle of the House bill—that Congress has the right to impose duties upon the products of the possessions of the United States-be kept in the bill.
