

Substitute For Wire Fences. The extraordinary demand for iron and steel products, and consequent high prices, is making wire fences cost more than a few years ago, but we are not sure but they are even now the cheapest fences one can build, considering durability as well as feat tle or no value. sidering durability as well as first cost. Cold Weather Affects Milk Supply. At the dairy test at the Columbian Exposition at Chicago, those in charge noticed that in a cold day, especially if it was windy, the cows, though well sheltered, gave milk much less rich than on the pleasant days, shrinking more in fat than in yield of milk, and this was noted of all breeds. Those who have their milk subjected to the Babcock test should remember that a cold spell is not a good time to make a large record. Some of the creameries that run during the winter have also reported that the amount of butter to the 100 pounds of milk was decreased by a storm of two or three days to a noticeable extent. In laying a fire much paper and wood are often wasted. Most house-maids cram a piece of paper tightly down, place a heavy layer of wood on down, piace a neavy layer of wood on top of it and cover this thickly with imps of coal. Then they are sur-prised because the fire will not burn. The wood for the morning fire ought to be placed on the rack the night before. The bundles become thoroughly dry and ignite quicker. To light a fire the paper should be loosely at ranged and the sticks of wood placed caning against it. Everything burns quicker when placed in an upright position. Small pieces of coal from yesterday's fire should be placed lightly about the wood and space between allowed for the nir to circulate. A fire thus made will use less paper and wood and burn much quicker than

kindled by the method mostly pracised. If ash-trays were more generally placed below the grate the labor of cleaning the latter would be con-siderably reduced and the dust caused by succeping up the ashes would be reduced to a minimum.

Milk Sherbet-To one quart of milk add one pound of sugar and the rind of half a lemon; scald and set away to cool, then add the whites of two eggs beaten to a stiff froth with half a cap-ful of sugar.
