PUBLIC LOCAL LAW.
Operative in Queen Anne's County passed at January Session of General Assembly of Maryland, Session of 1900.

CHAPTER 168.
AN ACT to refund to John R. Benton of Queen Anne's County a sum of money erroneously paid by him into the State Treasury.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the Comptroller of the Treasury be, and he is hereby authorized and directed to issue a warrant upon the Treasurer of this State in favor of John R. Benton of Queen Anne's County for the sum of thirty-six dollars and nine cents, being the amount of State Taxes erroneously paid by him into the State Treasury for the years eighteen hundred and ninety-three, eighteen hundred and ninety-four and eighteen hundred and ninety-five, the same having received the recommendation of the Treasury officials.

Sec. 2. And be it enacted, That this Act shall take effect from the date of its passage.
