Operative in Queen Anne's County passed at January Session of General Assembly of Maryland. Session of 1900. CHAPTER 186

AN ACT to fix, limit and determine the term of office of the County Commissioners of Queen Anne's County, that shall be hereafter elected or appointed perpetuating the succession to same, and repealing all laws or part of laws so far as they are inconsistent with the provisions of this Act.

Sec. 1. Be it enacted by the General As-sembly of Maryland, That as the term of each of the present County Commissioners of Queen Anne's County shall expire by limitations of time, should each continue of Queen Anne's County shall expire by limitations of time, should each continue to fill his office so long, his successorshall be elected to serve for the term of two years, and until his successor shall be elected and qualified, as follows: one of said Commissioners shall be elected at the General Election in November of nineteen hundred and one for the term of two years and until his successor shall be elected and qualified two fail.
