land, Session of 1900. CHAPTER 185

AN ACT to fix, limit and determine the term of office of the County Commissioners of Queen Anne's County, that shall be hereafter

Section 1 Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That William II. II. Hopkins, James R. Legg. John O. Phillips, Thomas P. Vansant and Blanc C. Norman and their successors in office are hereby created a body corporate and politic by the name and style of the Trustees of Trinity. Methodist Protestant Church and Church Property of Kent Island, Maryland and by that name shall have perpetual succession and shall be able and capable in law to sue and be sucd, plead and be impleaded, answer and be answered in every court of Law or Equity or before any Justice of the Peace or Judge thereof in this State, or elsewhere, and to make and have a common seal, and the aame to break, after or renew at pleasure, and also to do such other acts or things as may be necessary to carry into effect this corporation not inconsistent with the laws of this State or of the United States.

Section 2.
