Mrs. Archie Coursey for several the most important are dust, soap, fruit, vegetables, and neglect to properly dry the hands. Wash all vege-tables before paring. When the hands are stained by fruit or vegetables be sure to remove the stains before the hands come in contact with soap or soapy water. Remove the stains with an acid, such as lemon, vinegar or sour milk, then wash in clear water. When using soap and water for any purpose be sure to rinse off all the soap before wiping the hands. Always wipe the hands perfectly dry. Do not change soaps if you can avoid it, and always use a good soap. When sweeping and dusting wear loose fitting gloves. Have a pair of rubber gloves for use when it is necessary to have the hands in water a great deal. Grease spoils rubber, therefore the gloves must be washed perfectly clean as soon as the work is finished. A little bran and milk or vinegar will make the hands clean and smooth after dish-washing or any other work that roughens hem. With a little practice one can wash dishes as well and as quickly with a dish-mop as with a cloth and the hands. There should be two
