While it will not be as profitable to cut timber under a license, requiring that the government shall be paid from one-half cent to seven cents a cubic foot for all that is cut, according to grade, quality and value, as it would have been under outright concessions of the right to cut timber in certain sections of the islands, it will still be profitable and will save the money that has already been spent by the looters in preparing to handle the concessions they expected to get.

TO PREVENT SPREAD OF Smallpox Strict Quarantine Rules Will be

Issued by the State Board of Health, The State Board of Health held ts monthly meeting, Thursday in Baltimore when Secretary John S. Fulton made a full report as to the smallpox epidemic in Sussex county, Del., and the steps he had taken thus far to guard the health of the state from this source. It was decided to keep in abeyance the preparations for quarantining against Sussex county long enough to give the Del-

aware authorities an opportunity to show that they have control of the situation. If quarantine is necessary, it will prevent the transportation passengers to Maryland from points in Sussex to points in this state via the New York, Philadelphia and Norfolk, Delaware, Maryland and Virginia, Philadelphia, Wilmington and Baltimore, Queen Anne's and the Baltimore, Chesapeake and Atlantic Railroads. The quarantine regulations would not affect the railway employes, nor interfere with the handling of the freight, express or mail business. Dr. Fulton has informed the Sussex County Commissioners that the situation is not being effectively handled, and that relations with Maryland cannot with safety be allowed to continue except upon these conditions: The construction and organization of a pest camp or house for persons under observation; the assembly of all persons now sick with smallpox at one place, and of all exposed persons at the other, under constant medical on the lot opposite the M. Tin Cans Much Higher

It is undoubtedly true that the great tin can trust will wipe out, in a very little while, the business of the independent manufacturing of cans for the packing-houses. Many Baltimoreans, and hundreds of workers throughout the State and on the Peninsula will be thrown out of employment, and plants which cost much money will become worthless. Moreover, the business of packing will be damaged. A city contemporary says: "Canners will no longer be able to obtain the credit for cans that they have in the past. They will have to pay for the cans before they pack their goods, and from 40 to 50 per cent. of the country packers lack capital to do this.
