The Chestertown Transcript in speaking of the coming of one of our citizens, Mr. Sidney P. Townsend, to Chestertown, says:

"The appearance of another republican attorney in Kent may simplify Mr. John David Urie's arrangement of his ticket two years hence. He considers that the State Senate would be the most practical way of enlarging his political sphere of action. One of the embarrasments which has heretofore confronted him was that there was no republican attorney in the county to fill the candidacy for the State's attorneyship against a democrat. The appearance of Mr. Townsend will enable Mr. Urie to fill the place on his ticket and make the race for the senatorship."

It may be possible that Mr. Townsend will pluck a plum in Kent, but the dose he received last fall convinced him that plums comes too high for him to pluck in Queen Anne's. It would be a great shame should the Hon. John D. Urie meet his Waterloo by trying to carry a member of his political family who has been knocked out of the political arena.

Hon. A. P. Gorman was Tuesday elected by the General Assembly of Maryland to succeed the Hon. Geo. L. Wellington in the United States Senate who term expires March 4, 1903.

In the last campaign the fight was made against the Senator, but he proved the stronger and carried the Democrats' victory, thus proving that the people were with him and admired him as a leader. The following from the Baltimore American, the organ of the Republican party of Maryland, will explain the friendly feeling to our able representative:

"Of all the Democrats in Maryland, Mr. Gorman is the most experienced and influential. It matters not what may be thought of and charged against him here, the fact remains that he wields a potent influence among those who really shape the course of national legislation. And in his previous terms of service he always manifested a desire to promote the interests of Baltimore and Maryland, responding enthusiastically and vigorously to the calls made upon him. In consequence, the city and state owe to him much of the credit for the public improvements fostered by the government. That he will apply himself during the term for which he has just been re-elected to these same ends with his old-time energy and effectiveness, and that the state will profit thereby, we do not doubt."

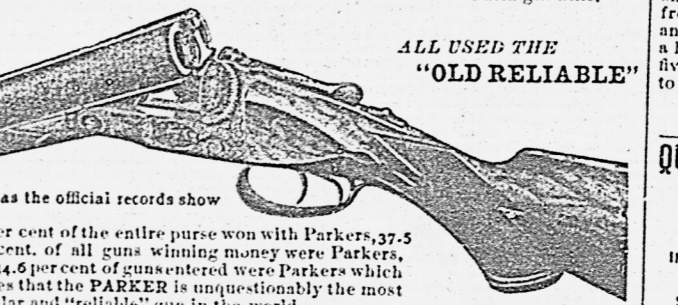
