The passing of a pension bill would have a tendency to create such a class of individuals in charge of the public schools. It would be a backward step from the present status of progres siveness, activity and interest in publie school work. Besides, the author is greatly mistaken as to the amount of sacrifice involved in teaching. By far the majority of teachers engage in that because they can find no employment which is more remunera-tive. It is not altogether the 'labor of love,' which he would picture it. We venture to say that in this county, where teachers are, on the average, paid better than in any other county in the State, there is not one teacher but would reluctantly make a change in his work for a higher salary. Teaching with them is a business proposition where so much brain power is expected for so much money. They are no more public servants tkan are university or col-lege professors, who instruct the rising generation in the higher branches at a higher salary. Equally public servants are the farmers who labor incessantly to produce the substance of which the State, whose laws they must obey, receives its part; the bankers, who conduct an institution for the financial relief and accommoda-tion of the public, are none the less BA public servants; the mercantile man, who saves the citizens the needless waste of time in going to distant marts of traffic by supplying them with their needs at almost their very doors, is a public benefactor; the editor who devotes his energies toward gathering information, sending it out in readable form and advocating measures which are for the public welfare is a public benefactor. The
