Hello! Are we to have wireless telephony as well as wireless telegraphy? The Army Signal Corps experimenters at Washington have succeeded in talking 450 feet apart at an ordinary pitch of voice heard as distinctly as if they were thirty or forty feet apart.

An artist of thirty-five eloped with and married a Boston woman of seventy, and has frankly confessed that it was for her money he did it. This is reprehensible, but for men to marry for money is not so unusual as to warrant the prominence which the newspapers give to the event.

A subscriber writes to know "what is the use of Judges if the Governor is allowed to commute criminals of Burke's stripe?" We are at a loss to answer the question direct, but we see where there is a bill before the legislature to pension retired Judges, and perhaps they are going to prepare in time for retiring the Judges, and when the jury decides on a verdict send it sealed to the Governor who will pass the sentence, which will be final.

No one is so sanguine as to imagine that the visit of Prince Henry of Germany to the United States and his hospitable reception will seriously influence the policy of the two countries toward each other. National relations are not often affected in that way. But the abolition of the German sugar will go far toward bringing about a thoroughly good understanding between the countries. Against this the spirit of protection will struggle in vain.

On his recent voyage across the Atlantic, Signor Marconi achieved a brilliant triumph for his wireless telegraphy. From the station at Cornwall, England, messages were transmitted to Signor Marconi on the steamer Philadelphia for a distance of 2,699 miles. With this result so soon accomplished, who can doubt that before many more years Signor Marconi's prediction that he can telegraph around the world without the use of wires will be verified?

The Wye Literary Society at its regular debate Monday evening, at Wye Mills decided unanimously "that the Mind of Woman is inferior to that of Man." Whilst the legislature of Maryland a few days ago decided "that the Mind of Woman is Superior to that of Man," in passing the local option law for this district. We have read the law carefully, and failed to find a single clause that places any penalty on a woman for dispensing fermented liquors, or for selling the same. It is hardly possible that this bill was so framed as to give the W. C. T. U. and others a monopoly of the whiskey business and thereby put the legislature of Maryland on record as favoring trusts?

In our local column will be found a full text of the local option law for this district, which was recently passed by the legislature. The law is sweeping in its territory to say the least, but the following amendment would be found beneficial, as with it added, violators would be few:

"Provided, that any person who shall import, buy or barter, directly or indirectly, for his, her or other use, any beverage stronger than water, shall on conviction before any justice of the peace or the circuit court of said county, be fined not less than one dollar nor more than one thousand, and for failure to pay said fine and costs to be imprisoned in county jail a day for each dollar, fine and costs, and for the second offense, be sent to the House of Correction for not less than six months nor more than twenty-five years. And for the third or last offense, be imprisoned in the penitentiary for life or death on the gallows, or both in the discretion of the court, and also, provided, that the Governor not be allowed to commute the sentence.

"Provided, however, that the above section can be construed so as to include full-fledged prohibitionists or temperance advocates who are able to keep five gallons or more of fermented liquors, bitters, or adulterated coffee, for medicinal purposes only, or in case a friend calls.

Women are eligible to practice before our courts according to a bill passed by the legislature.

The unfortunate city of Paterson, N. J., suffered more from the flood of last week than from its recent disastrous fire. The flames spared the big mills, but the flood compelled a dozen of them to suspend operations, with the result that at least 2,000 people were thrown out of employment. Over 500 houses were invaded by the waters and made uninhabitable. The money damage is not near the figures of the fire loss, but still it is considerable, being close to half a million dollars. And it is a dead loss, as it is not offset by insurance to the extent of a single dollar. Truly the people of Paterson have been most unfortunate in this double visitation.

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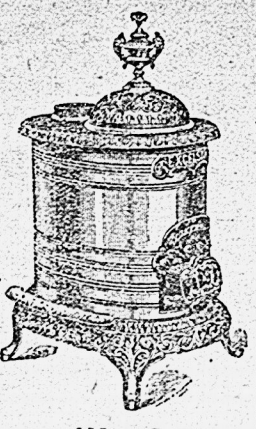
