Rev. Wm. C. McCracken writes to the New York Churchman, and which was republished in the Easton Ledger, Thursday, by request, quite a lengthy article defending Bishop Potter for his course "in believing that there was much fraud, delusion and hypocrisy in prohibition." We append the following clause from his

"Now I live in Kansas, and have lived here for some two years, during which time I have been in many of the principal places in the State, and I have made many inquiries, besides noticing the local papers. The first thing that attracted my attention here was the number of drunken men as compared with a Minnesota town where \$1,000 license was charged. This place has a population of 6,800, the Minnesota town about 4,000. I saw more drunken men (civilians not counting soldiers) in four months here than I had seen there in over five years. There were four "saloons" in the Minnesota place. I do not know how many there are here. Some rumor says nine that pay or once paid a fine, other rumors say thirty-two. At all events you can see them, or what is very like them, plate-glass window, names, bystanders, etc., all along the principal street here. There are eight drug stores on the same street, which rumor says, with one or two exceptions, do a saloon-business. I do not know; but I can see in some cases a "saloon crowd" around and in a drug store who buy cigars, etc., and I can see many men, perhaps pious, who come from behind the rear prescription counter with a 'pleased expression' on their faces, which I have never observed where castor oil or vermifuge or even Epsom salts had been enjoyed."

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
