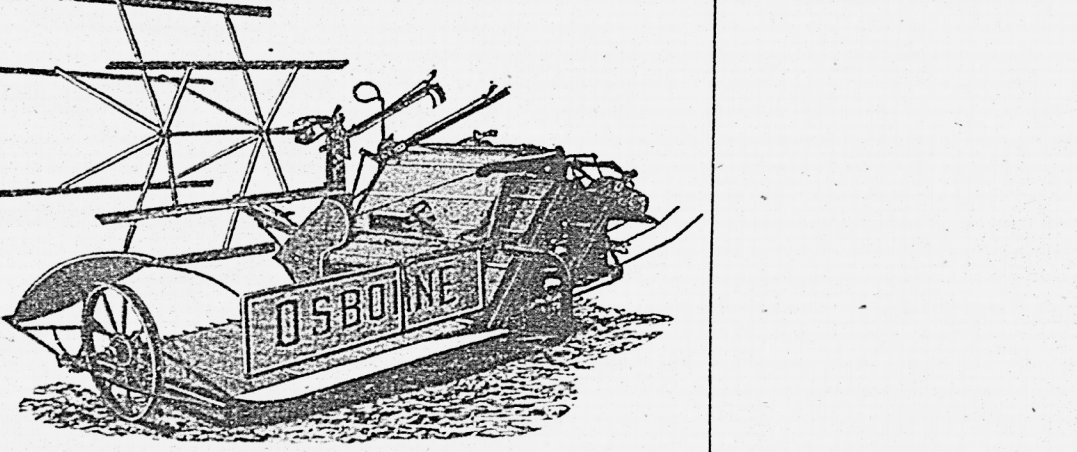
I have closed my Exchange Business at Queenstown, and all parties indebted to me are requested to remit to me at Wye Mills.
