WASHINGTON LETTER. e News Collected at the National Capi tal by Our Regular Correspondent.

VASHINGTON, May 12th, 1902.-"The bill reported by the Philippine committee is one of the most iniquitous measures ever presented to a Congress of the United States," said Senator Dubois, of Idaho, yesterday when I asked him his opinion of the bill itself. "By the provisions of the bill, a commission composed of three men, is given the most absolute powers over the Filipinos and their lands. The edicts of the commission will become laws unless they are negatively acted upon by Congress and, if Congress had the time it would be impossible for it to judge of these edicts at this distance, 8,000 miles away. These three men can grant franchises to whomever they see fit and require in return for the same such compensation as they choose. They can lease land in im mense tracts to corporations for whatever rental they desire. They can grant the privileges of cutting timber to such corporations as they may choose to befriend and on such terms as they may be disposed to make. It is ridiculous to say that the democrats are opposing a step towards the self-government to which they be-lieve the Filipinos are entitled. The democrats are doing all in their power to save the Filipinos from being delivered to an oligarchy which can sell them, body and soul, from whose actions they have no redress, from a despotic government in which they have absolutely no voice.

"A careful reading of the Philip pine bill will convince any intelligent person that the Philippine commission, should the bill become law, would have powers that are today possessed by no European ruler save, perhaps, the Russian Czar. There are in the Philippines millions of acres of rich agricultural lands, more than there is in the United States west of the Missouri river and the other resources of the islands are beyond computation and so long as human nature remains human nature the delegation of such plenipotentiary power to a commission composed of a few favored individuals is bound to result in corruption. It is folly to plead the high character of the pres- cattle. S. E. Kirby. ent commission. Its members may all be dead in a month. As a general proposition, it is evident that the best men in the United States are not going to forsake their homes and their business interests and go to the Philippines to administer the affairs of the islands. The men who seek those positions will be the usual class of place hunters who regularly besiege the President for positions which carry handsome salaries. The passage of this bill will inevitably result in scandals from which the fair name of the United States will long suffer."

All last week in the Senate was spent in debating the Philippine bill and the prospects are that all this be spent in the same way. Senator Dubois tells me that he expects to address the Senate on the subject and Senator Bailey told me that he would probably do so. Senator Foraker will speak for the republicans and probably Senator Spooner. 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THE QUEEN CAROLINE.

Tuesday Afternoon in the Presence of Vast Assemblage she is Launched.

One of the most successful launch ngs seen in Baltimore for some time -that of the steamboat Queen Caroline-took place Tuesday afternoon from the yard of the Baltimore Ship onilding and Drydock Company, Locust Point. Several thousand people witnessed the event, while the vessel, started down the ways on time and took the water most gracefully.

Promptly at 4 o'clock the wedging p of the vessel from the keel blocks to the launching ways was announced by a chorus of hammers in the hands of two score of ship mechanics. Next the blocks were cut away and the supporting timber knocked out. It had been raining during these

preliminaries, and many took shelter under sheds or the bottom of vessels building but shortly after the launching party ascended to the stand unler the vessel's bow the sun burst through the clouds and lit the Union Jack, state colors and two national ensigns on the Queen Caroline, a rainbow of flags that stretched from the top of the big derrick near the hipment of soft crabs this season Queen Caroline to the wharf, and 30 or 40 flags that fluttered in the breeze from the tugs assembled off the yard. All present were brought to attention by the noise of the sawing of the tripper planks—the two last timbers that held the vessel on the ways. The sponsor, Miss Marie Bosley, daughter of Mr. William H. Bosley, president of the Queen Anne's Railroad Com-pany, dressed in a blue and white costume and carrying a great boquet of American beauty roses, stood at the bow of the craft with a bottle of

champagne, decorated in red, white and blue ribbons, ready to christen the craft. Suddenly a few voices shouted, "There she goes!" and the noise swelled into loud cheering from the crowd that hemmed in the craft as the Queen Caroline slowly started

down the inclined ways. editor is put to the test in devising Miss Bosley, who stood under the starboard bow near the low water figures on the stem, gripped her bottle of champague by its neck and swiftly swung it with an uppercut stroke against the bow, saying "I christen thee Queen Caroline." The champagne flew, while the covering of colored ribbons made a prison of the mooted question. Book Agent Ransacks a House in Kent County and Assaults a Young Woman. The residents of Chestertown and

icinity were startled Friday morning of last week by the report that a brutal assault and robbery had been committed at the home of Wilbur Eliason near that town. The details of the crime are given as follows:

Mr. and Mrs. Eliason and entire family were temporarily away from home, no one being in the house but a young lady governess, Miss Lizzie Gallagher, and a colored woman. The latter was at work in the kitchen and knew nothing of the events which transpired in the front of the house.

Miss Gallagher states that about 10

o'clock two men drove to the house and one of them rang the front door bell. She walked toward him and he immediately approached her saying that he was a book agent. Miss Gallagher told him that there was no one home but herself, and he there upon seized her by the throat and choked her to the floor. The young lady weighs about 160, is about five feet, five inches in height and is a woman of nerve and unusual strength and struggled valliantly with her assailant. She was finally thrown against a book-case striking her stomach with great force and causing nausea and unconsciousness. When she recovered she found that her elegant suit of hair had been cut off, her face was seriously scratched and her body bruised in many places. She went at once to the field to inform Mr. Eliason of what had happened, and as he was not there one of the farm hands was dispatched to Chestertown. Mr.

hurried to his home. An inspection of the house showed that from the third story to the first floor it had been ransacked. The contents of every bureau drawer in the house was turned topsy turvey; packing trunks were emptied and their ontents scattered in every direction; and clothing was thrown about. Mrs Eliason's jewel case was emptied and rings and other valuables were left n confusion. A diamond ring was taken, while a pearl ring a band ring and other jewelry were left undis-turbed. Whether the robbery took place before or after the assault no one knows.

The sheriff and other town officers were promptly notified, and they immediately took steps to apprehend the perpetrator of the deed but up to this writing not the slightest clue or trace of the villian has been found. He, or they, have disappeared as myseriously as though swallowed up by the earth. No one has been found who saw a team enter or pass out of Mr. Eliason's gate about the time of the crime. There is not the slight est evidence of wheel tracks and abolutely no clue for the officers to follow. The young lady says she cannot accurately describe her assailant, but is sure she would recognize

him if she saw him again. The crime has aroused the indig nation of the community, but all are nonplussed by the mystery surround ing the appearance and disappear ance of the perpetrator.
