Whatever the Congress, which is responsible for laws that put it in the power of the employers of labor to exact an unjust proportion of the product of labor, must set about the immediate repair of the injuries and irregularities that have resulted from the operation of such laws.

Yesterday was a legal holiday in Maryland and in many other states—a time set apart to do honor to the Union soldiers who gave their lives for their country's service. The chief service of the day was in the hands of the comparatively small body of veterans of the Civil War, who gathered at the cemeteries and strewed with flowers the grave of every soldier as a reminder that they tenderly cherished the memories of their comrades, and have not forgotten the sacrifices even of those who were unknown to them in life, but whose bones rest in a soldier's tomb. Even though their names be unknown, their graves are adorned with fragrant flowers, emblematic of the flag for which they fought and the peace which they helped to establish. The sad reaper is playing havoc with the ranks of the veterans, for forty years have passed since the fate of this nation hung in the balance and the North joined battle with the South. When the last of these veterans has gone to the final roll-call, the beautiful services of Memorial Day will not be abandoned. The generation that has arisen since the war will not be playing a part in the celebration and will see that it is continued in the years to come. It has become an annual national observance, and can never die out.
