When the Republican party "goes to the country," this campaign, what will it say in answer to the question why the Republican Senate refused to accept the Cuban Reciprocity bill sent to it by the Republican House of Representatives? Will it be frank and say that it was because the bill was objectionable to the Sugar Trust in that it absolutely repealed the differential duties on refined sugars, which would have been a benefit to the people but might have pinched the profits of the Sugar Trust? And yet that is the only truthful answer that can be made.

General Edward S. Bragg, consulgeneral at Havana, denies that he wrote in a letter to his wife that "Uncle Sam might as well try to make a whistle out of a pig's tail as to try to make something out of the Latin race." What he did write, he says, was that "when Uncle Sam got through trying to make a whistle outof a pig's tail he would report whether he could make an Anglo-Saxon out of a Cuban." But the difference between what he is charged with writing, and what he admits he wrote, is so slight that it is no wonder that the people of Havana are mad at General

Here and there may be found newspapers disposed to be merry at the expense of Mr. Watterson and Mr. Bryan on the subject of Mr. Cleve land and another nomination for the presidency. Well, those two distinguished men are indulging in no pipe dream. Mr. Cleveland would not object to making another race, and a number of his admirers have hopes of supporting him again. Reorganization means to them not only a re pudiation of Bryanism, but a return to Clevelandism. Gossip to this effect is often heard in political circles. It is not too early, therefore, for those who have other views to express them. It is true, indeed, as Mr. Watterson contends, that the fatal return to Cleveland leadership in 1892 might have been prevented if those who foresaw its unhappy consequences had moved in time and with sufficient energy and aggressiveness. So far as he is concerned, Mr. Watterson is not going to repeat that mistake. He is against Mr. Cleveland, and has begun a serial story likely to run some 20 months or more giving the reason why. But who is his choice for the next nomination and upon what platform? He is too much of a man to belong to the Micawber faction of his

The story of the inventor who claims to have found a way of extracting the oxygen from the atmosphere and by combining it with some thing else manufacture a fuel that will revolutionize all the present methods of producing light and heat is attracting a good deal of more-or less serious attention-probably less than more. An exchange sees in it a somewhat alarming contingency. The editor calls attention to the fact that a method of drawing the nitrogen from the air and turning it into cheap artificial nitrates is already in use. And he points out that if all the nitrogen in the air is turned into fertilizers, and all the oxygen into light and fuel, the question will be asked-if there is anybody left to ask it: "What are we going to breathe?" And then the editor nervously suggests that now is the time for some inventive genius to lay the foundations for an everlasting fortune by inventing a substitute for air.

The editor puts the case in a graphic and impressive manner, but he appears to forget one element that might exert considerable influence over the final outcome. There is no doubt that as the supply of breathing material grows less some mammoth syndicate, chartered perhaps in New Jersey, will suddenly rush in and cornerall the available air that is left, thus holding the fertilizing interest, the light and fuel interest and the very existence of the human race at its merch. Wouldn't that asphyxiate you!

### Notice to the Public. BELOW is published the Local Law re lating to Roads and Bridges in Queer

Inting to Roads and Bridges in Queen Ame's county:

(1869) Art. 17, Section 102.

(220) "If any person shall alter, change, obstruct or encroach upon any road in Queen Anne's county, or cut down, destroy or injure any bridge, causeway, boundary, mark or direction thereon, he shall, on conviction thereof, in the Circuit Court for said county, be fined at the discretion of the Court, not exceeding fifty dollars, to be paid to and accounted lofe by the Supervisor of the district in which the damage may be done."

The County Commissioners hereby give notice that any person hauling dirt or sand from any public road in said county, or who shall obstruct any drain or ditch draining any road by placing brush or other material or filling the same with dirt will be prosecuted before the Circui Court for Queen Anne's county.

And notice is hereby given that all Trac And notice is hereby given that all Traction Engines must, before crossing any bridge, to first place Bridge Boards across the bridge crossed by said engine, the owner of the engine to carry at least two 16 feet boards and all bridges over 20 feet the county will keep such bridges supplied with boards. Nor will any engine be allowed to stand on any bridge to take water.

Any injury resulting to any bridge where any of the above regulations are violated will be prosecuted before the Circuit Court for Queen Anne's county. All Supervisors of Roads are hereby di-






