And the exhibits—the big pumpkins, the mammoth squashes, the fresh churned and blushing butter, the fat hog and the portly steer, the hen that lays six eggs a day and the horse that trots a mile in 2.15—they are all there. But best of all, neighbor rubs elbows with neighbor, and when it is all over there isn't a man in the woods who hasn't a great big, heavy hand-shake or a jovial slap on the back to carry home as one of the pleasant memories of the occasion. Long live the county fair, and may its pumpkins never shrivel!
