

WASHINGTON LETTER.

Some News Collected at the National Capital by Our Regular Correspondent. WASHINGTON, Nov. 3rd, 1902.— Judge Griggs says the democrats are bound to win, that Coler will be elected governor of New York by 25,000 majority and that the democrats will have a majority of 16 members in the House. Griggs has just returned from New York and believes he left everything there ripe for victory. That the President is exceedingly anxious is evidenced by his somewhat unprecedented advance issued from the White House just before he left the city. He instructed Secretary Cortelyou to say, "The President is watching with keenest interest and most earnest desire for Republican success the various Congress canvasses and those State canvasses in States like New York and Pennsylvania where Governors are to be elected." Such a statement from the President of the United States is so unusual that it can only be interpreted as meaning that he is extremely anxious over the result and desires to inject into the campaign all of his personal popularity and spirit possible. There is no question but that the republicans are thoroughly demoralized in the States and it will not be surprising if they fail to poll anything like the vote they anticipate. Chairman Griggs talked recently of the results to be obtained by a revision of the tariff. He pointed out that the Americans pay just double what other people pay for their lead pencils because of the high tariff on them. The price of American graphite pencils, to the trade is \$3.75 per gross, while they are sold to the foreign trade for \$2.25. The price trade of the United States is supplied by just four firms which are so protected by the present tariff that competition is impossible and they are charging American consumers nearly double what they charge the foreigner. There have been many remarkable features about the campaign just closed. The President and members of the cabinet have been most positive in their promises of reforms which the real leaders of the party oppose and oppose vigorously. Mr. Moody has, on several occasions, promised the immediate repeal of the duty on anthracite coal, while Hanna, Aldrich, Allison, et al, have protested that there must be no change in the sacred tariff schedule. Attorney General Knox has been promising the people that there would be additional legislation looking to the control of the trusts. The real leaders have said, half heartedly that there would be a change in present statutes if it was demonstrated that such change was necessary, but Knox says unqualifiedly that such change is necessary and points out the instances where he has been unable to prosecute trusts and where the revenue of the law. The President has caused it to be made known that he intends to recommend a bipartisan board to consider tariff revision while Senator Hanna has assured the people they must "stand pat" and not touch any schedule. The Minnesota republicans have promised sweeping tariff reform and the eastern republicans have urged the reelection of the party because such reelection would prevent tariff reform. The democrats however, have adhered to one issue and that is tariff revision. They believe that the infant industries have been nursed into trusts by the tariff and they are anxious to reduce that tariff in the interest of the consumer. Messrs. Bryan, Cleveland and Hill, all the ablest men in the party in fact, have stated the issue to be the same and have emphasized the necessity of tariff reduction for the welfare of the country. That the people are not so easily deceived on all sides and that they demand some steps towards their relief is equally evident. That many persons will vote for the republican candidates with the belief that they will effect the desired end is doubtless the case, but those voters will have an opportunity to see that no republican vote is ever cast against the interests of the trusts and the capitalists. The gravest apprehension is felt in administration circles over the statement which President Baer made to the Anthracite Coal Strike Commission, that there were numerous operators in the anthracite field who were not committed to the arbitration proceedings and who were not even consulted in the negotiations preliminary thereto. Were it not for the fact that the election is so close and that the coal strike was settled and settled for three years, it is more than probable that the President would have communicated with Baer and asked him what he meant by that statement in view of his representations at the White House. As it is, the people believe that Roosevelt has settled the strike and it is desired that they shall do so, at least until after election. The argument which it is feared Baer and his associates, in the event that the commission finds against them, will advance, is that it would be unreasonable of the President to ask them to abide by the decision of the commission without insisting on that decision's being equally respected by their competitors. Of course the President cannot insist on anything except through Baer and the railway president who participated in the conference and subsequent agreement at the White House. The commission has invited the other operators, those whom Baer declares were "in no way compromised" by his agreement, to participate in the sessions of the commission and to voluntarily submit themselves to the same inquiry as the railway president but there is no reason to believe that they will do so unless Baer and the other trust magnates insist and that they have practically refused to do so.

Not So Worse.

Maryland Elects two Democrats and four Republicans.

Ellegood could not stem the Tide with anti-bribery. Queen Anne's leads the Procession.

The congressional candidates elected and their respective pluralities are as follows: First District—William H. Jackson, Republican, by 1,633. Second District—J. Fred C. Talbot, Democrat, by 1,532. Third District—Frank C. Waechter, Republican, by 179. Fourth District—James W. Denny, Democrat, by 585. Fifth District—Stedley E. Mudd, Republican, by 4,620. Sixth District—George A. Pearce, Republican, by 3,888. The majorities for Messrs. Mudd and Pearce are very large, but there was in neither case any marked increase in the Republican vote. There was, however, a great decrease in the Democratic vote. Pearce's vote in Frederick was 1,000 less than he received two years ago. In Allegany it fell off about 1,500 and in Washington county 1,100. His increased majority there came from the great increase in the Democratic vote. At the State election last year every county on the Eastern Shore gave a majority for the head of the Democratic ticket—Dr. Hering, candidate for Comptroller of the Treasury. This time only three counties gave Democratic majorities—Cecil, Queen Anne's and Worcester—and the Eastern Shore swung around from a Democratic majority of about 3,000 a year ago to over 1,000 for the Republican candidate. Queen Anne's was the banner Democratic county, and gave almost the normal majority of about 500. The only county in which there was a decided Democratic slump are Worcester and Wicomico. The former gave Dr. Hering last year a majority of 1,200 which dwindled this year to 58.

COAST VOTE.

Making allowances for the large stay-at-home vote, Queen Anne's county showed up well Tuesday. The most sanguine expected not over five hundred and pessimistic Democrats had ventured to assert that the Democratic majority would be less than 250. It is with confidence and pride that the Democrats of this county point to the fact that we returned twice over as great a majority for Ellegood as all of the other counties on the Eastern Shore combined.
