It would seem as if the performance of her, engagements, depends on the successes of her arms and those of her allies. While humbled by defeat, and despairing of success from continental alliance, and while the return of a conquered army from Spain were remembered. Britain inade advances to America and wished to have one friend left, when all the nations of the earth were combined against her At that time she seemed deserted by all the world. The cause of Spain had been abandoned as hopeless; Portugal was considered indefensible; Sweden was torn by intestine commotions, and Austria manifested no intention of again contending with the victorious armies of Bonaparte. Suddenly the scene was changed. Austria was covered with innumerable armies; Bonaparte was compelled by this event to leave the then scene of war, and, by withdrawing his armies from Spain and Portugal, afforded those two nations an opportunity of recovering the conquered provinces; Sweden, too, had begun to subside from the tumults of civil discord into domestic tranquility.

By comparing the dates of these events we may form an accurate opinion of the motives which induced the ministry of Britain to violate the confidence reposed in her, and prove that she is devoid of every principle which can actuate good

On the 9th day of May a Diet was called, which declared the throne of Sweden vacant, deposed Gustavus IV. and determined on framing a new constitution. The king of England informed parliament on the 25th. day of May that he had renewed his friendly intercourse with Austria: and on the 24th day of the some month, the proclamation of his Britannic Majesty was issued, declaring that his Minister in America had acted without authority. From this it must appear that the hope of continental success was the real cause. Mr. Canning has now convinced the world that although he may possess the cunning of a shool boy, he wants every ingredient which constitutes a great man. Bonaparte is already in Vicana, the capital of the Austrian empire, and preparing to return to Spain and Portugal, and the amhassadors from Sweden have not been acknowledged by the emperor of all the Russias.
