Legislature of Maryland.

WEDNESDAY, November 8. The house met. Two additional members appeared, qualified and took their

Mr. Steuart from the committee delivered to the Speaker a bill, entitled, an Act to settle and ascertain the salary of the members of the Council for the ensuing year, which was read the first and second time, passed, and sent to the Senate.

Leave was given to bring in a bill, entitled, an Act, concerning insolvency. Messrs. Bland, Worthington and Wilkinson a committee to prepare and bring in the same.

The following order was read: that the Committee of Claims procure one copy of the "Maryland Republican" and "Masyland Gazette," printed in the City of Annapolis, for each member of the Legislature during the present session. On the question being put that the house assent to the same, and the yeas and nays being required, it appeared that 27 were in favor of, and 30 against it; -it was therefore ne-

Mr. Brent offered resolutions approbatory of the Embargo, and approving the conduct of the Administration of our General Government; -- for which see the last Maryland Republican.

On motion of Mr. Blund, leave was given to bring in a bill, entitled, an act concerning the amendment of judicial proceedings.

On motion of Mr. J. H. Thomas, leave was given to bring in a bill confirming the amendment to the 32d and 37th Sect. of the Constitution and form of Government (abolishing all that part which made it necessary to convene, the Legislature upon the death, resignation or removal of the governor.)

On motion of J. H. Thomas, leave was given to bring in a bill, entitled, an act, for the appointment by the people, of the Justices of the Levy Court in the several counties of this State. Mr. J. H. Thomas, Mr. Brent and Mr. Kerr, were appointed a committee to prepare and bringfin the same.

A petition from sundry inhabitants, of Washington County, praying for a road from Bloomsborough to intersect the harpsburgh road, from thence to Capt. Blackfords ferry, was read and refered.

A petition from sundry inhabitants of Frederick County, praying for a road from Samuel Reynold's taverit on the main foad leading from Taney town to Petersburgh, in Pennsylvania by Meuse's mill, to intersect the new main road leading from Taney town to Westminster, at or near the widow Smith's house, was read and refer-

It being then announced that Ed-3 ward Lloyd, Esq. having a constitutional majority of votes, was duly elected governor,

On motion, a committee of two: members on the part of the House were appointed, with such committee as the Senate would appoint. jointly to wait on the Governor elect and inform him of his election, and that both houses were ready to receive him in order to qualify in the Senate room.

At half past one o'clock, Messrs. Partridge and Bowie, from the Senate, ? informed the house that the Governor elect was then waiting in the Senate. chamber, and ready to take the qualifications prescribed by the Constitution and laws of the State. The members of the house then proceeded to the Senate chamber, when the respect ive oaths of office were administered by the Speaker of the House, and the President of the Senate. The delegates then retired to their own room; and, after the transaction of some local business, adjourned.
