to claim them; to tax, restrict or prohibit our trade, whenever she was ingenious enough to find excuses for it. We should. have been at open hostilities with all the world but Britain; and have had the consoling reflection of being connected with the awful destiny, which their own accounts concur in pronouncing at hand ! Enviable sortune sor America! Instead of having our pending weight and influence as an enemy or a friend to put into a scale of consideration in the negociation with both France and England, to obtain justice from each, our lot would this day have been cast. We should have made a war! popular with France and all ber friends, for having voluntarily selected her for an enemy; and the war declared by us, would leave France no choice but to continue it, or to submit to us and to Britain. On the other hand, it would invite Britain to force us to maintain the desperate war, by threatening continually the same measures which first forced us into it.

It remains to be discovered, by what conning the party will get clear of the di-Jemma produced by their late declarations with respect to the disposition of Britain to do us justice, and to treat amicably with us; and the facts, as evidenced in that nation's lately violated faith.

Of the sentiments of the body and bulk of Americans, we are well apprized, and have sufficient evidence of, in the result of the elections; but the doctrines yet to be adopted by the remaining opposition, is quite unfathomable.

Diplomatic Entertainments.

As a number of British actors have been sor some time employed in amusing an - American audience with a sort of Puppetshow entertainment, it may not be improper to give the Public some little account of the performance.—The first part was a homhastic piece called " The Treatn," in which sundry great men were made to perform very grave and ceremonious paris, something in the stile of semale children playing "madams;" the whole of which was concluded by the display of a !ronsparent " Note" attached to the contract by his Britannic Majesty's minister, which at once arowed the juggle, and signified -that " notwithstanding its formal ratification, his Majesty would consider himself at liberty to violate it whenever it became his interest to do so !"-The second piece, called. "Restitution," was borrowed from the farce of the Village Lawyer, in which Mr. Rose performed the part of Sheenface, and cried " bah! bah!" very gracefully to our demands sor satisfiction in the case of the Chesapeake .- The third part, cienominated the " Erskine Engagement," got up by the "Joker of jakes," Mr. Canning, was characterized for the perfidy and depravity of the plot, which was no outrageously villaiaous, that it was believed by many that the audience would not submit to any more of these vile degrading impositions .- A fourth part, I however, has just been concluded, called is Intalt upon injuru," in which a fumous performer from Copenhagen, lus attempted an impertinent character, but has been deservedly hirsed off the American stage. It is not expected, however, that this will deter the Managers of the entertainment from attempting to carry on the performance. The next part, very probably, may introduce " Peter Porcupine or Mrs. Clarke, as British envoys to America !"if so, the Afterpiece will certainly be acted by the andience themselves, in which the farce called " Catching a Yankee," may be repeated.

Leave given to bring in a bill re-gulating the mode of issuing execu-

Mr. Tabbs presented a petition from Adam Backstrouser, of Washington County, praying to be confirmed in his right to a certain tract of land. Referred to Messrs. Tabbs, Bowles and Cellar.

A Bill to alter, open and widen a certain road in Anne-Arundel county, was read and passed.

The oill relating to the descents of such slaves as are to be manumitted at a certain period, was made the order of the day for Wednesday next.

The bill for the relief of William Gibson, of Harford County, was read and passed.

Leave given to bring in a bill supplementary to the act for the better

regulation of apprentices. An Act for the relief of Adam Backstrouser, was read a first and second time, (by special permission)

and passed. An Act authorising a Lottery in

Frederick County, was returned from the Senate, endorsed will pass. A bill for the relief of Lucas: Shock, of Washington County, was read a first and second time (by permission) and passed.

An Act for the relief of William Hall, an insolvent debtor of Baltimore, was read a first time. This bill gives the Judges of Baltimore County court, the same powers of; releasing the petitioner under the insolvent law, as if he had resided in sed. this State for two years.

An act confirming the right of John Myers and Herbert Whier, to a tract of land called "Contest," in Allegany County, underwent a. first reading; -and leave being given, was read a second time, and passed.

A petition from the said Myers and Whier; relating to a tract of 25 acres claimed by others, on a re-survey of said tract, called "Contest," and requesting their title to be also confirmed therein, was read and referred.

Leave being granted, Mr. J. H. Thomas presented a bill confirming the acts of such Justices of the peace of this State, as hold, or have held, offices under the government of the United States.

An Act divorcing Thomas Burk, and Elizabeth Burk, underwent a first reading.

An Act making provision for the education and support of Edward Spurrier, son of Capt. Spurrier deceased, was read a first time. (This bill, very honorable to the feelings, patriotism and gratitude of the Legislature, proposes that the Governor for the time being, shall be his guardian, and treat him in every respect as the adopted Child of the State.) At 12 o'clock the House adjourned.

In a part of our impression of Saturday, we erroneously stated the name of this orphan, to be J. H. Helt; -it was that gentleman who signed the petition in favor of Edward Spurrier.

MONDAY, NOVEMBER 20th.

Mr. Bland presented a petition from Clement Brook, of Baltimore, praying a special act of insolvency. Read and referred to Messrs. Bland, Worthington and Randall.

A petition from Aquila Hall, and others, relative to a road in Baltimore County, from World's End Hill, to the York Meeting House, was read and referred.

The Clerk read certain communications from the Treasurer of the Eastern Shore, stating the expences of the last year to the 30th ult. Referred to a committee.

An act for the maintenance of David Hamilton, of Montgomery county, by the Levy Court of the same, was read a first time.

Mr. Bland, presented a petition from Sarah Brown, and George Matchet, of the city of Baltimore, praying Legislative permission to raise, by Lottery, the sum of twenty five thousand dollars, for the purpose of electing a building for the accommedation of the students of the Baltimore Female Aczdemy, was read and referred to Messrs. Bland, Worthington and Randall.

A memorial of David Stuart and David C. Stuart, agents of the London Phenix Insurance Company, praying the law preventing foreigners from affecting insurance in this State, may not pass, was read and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Worthington presented a netition from James Calhoun, and Dugan'& O'Donnel, Inspectors of Tobacco, in the city of Baltimore, praying permission to erect additional warehouses; was read and referred to Messrs. Worthington, Randall,

Hopewell, Frazier and Brown. A petition was read from John Latour, of the city of Baltimore, stating that he was prevented from obtaining the benefit of the insolvent law, in consequence of certain allegations being adduced against him, by his creditors, charging him with having illegally transferred his property to Van Wyck & Dorsey, with a view to defraud his creditors, &c. and praying relief. Reserred to Messrs. Worthington, Bland, and Randall.
