

the whole or some part thereof, by one or more of the judges of the general court, or three or more of the judges of the county court; and the governor and council shall cause the case of the party to be entered at large on the proceedings of the council, and subscribe their names thereto.—April 1782, c. 42, § 1.

9. The governor and council may remit the whole or any part of a fine, penalty or forfeiture, imposed or to be imposed in any court of law, provided if the same be certain, and not in the discretion of the court, that the case of the person be stated in writing by the court before whom such fine, &c. shall be imposed, and a recommendation be made for a remission, by one or more of the judges of the general court, or three or more of the judges of the county court; and the governor and council shall cause the case of the party to be entered at large on the proceedings of the council, and shall subscribe their names thereto—*ibid.* § 3.

10. The governor and council may remit the whole or any part of a fine heretofore imposed, or hereafter to be imposed, by any militia court martial, provided the case and reasons for remission be stated and signed by the persons granting the same—*ibid.* § 5.

11. The governor and council may appoint such an additional number of surveyors as they may think necessary to complete the surveys made by the intendant or commissioners of confiscated property, or whose plats and certificates shall be returned to the land office, and received and examined by the examiner general—1785, c. 66, § 3.

12. The governor and council are authorized to appoint a person of integrity and abilities, to solicit and receive, on the behalf and credit of this state, loans of current money or tobacco, not exceeding 30,000l. in current money, and 3000 hhd. of tobacco, to be paid in 3 years, with interest at 8 per cent. per annum—1785, c. 88, § 1, 2.

13. ————— to appoint some fit and proper person to finish the transactions and sales of the late intendant of the revenue, and of the commissioners for confiscated British property, and to take into his possession and care all books and papers respecting the same, and to make sale of all the confiscated British property remaining unsold; on bond with security, payable on or before the 1st day of Jan. 1790, with interest, and to compound thereon, and to instruct and advise such person from time to time.—*ibid.* § 3.
