

person, for the delivery of the tobacco remaining in such warehouse, so by them discontinued, and may cause the said tobacco to be removed to the most convenient warehouse, and put under the care of the inspector or inspectors, whose duty it shall be to pass receipts for and deliver the same agreeably to the directions of the act, to which this is a supplement.—1795, c. 71, § 1.

17. Where any warehouse belonging to the county has been or may be discontinued, the justices of the county, or a majority of them, shall sell the same, together with the scales, weights, and other the implements thereunto belonging, upon such terms as they may think proper, and apply the money arising therefrom to the use of their county; and if it should so happen that the boundaries of the public ground on which the house or houses may stand cannot be ascertained by the justices, they, or a majority of them may petition the county court for a commission to prove and perpetuate the same, in the prosecution of which the same proceeding shall be observed as is directed by law to be observed by individuals in similar cases.—*ibid.* § 2.

18. The justices of the peace for Montgomery county, or any three or more of them, shall meet at the court-house in said county, and appoint two of the said justices to contract with workmen to erect warehouses, at the public expence of said county, and like weights, scales, prizes, and all other things that shall be necessary for that purpose, shall be procured under the same regulations as is directed by the act, entitled, An act to regulate the inspection of tobacco; and there shall be paid 4s. current money per hoghead, by the same persons, and in the same manner, as is directed by the last recited act. 1790, c. 30; § 2.

19. Every justice of the peace shall, at the levy court of his county, account for all sums of money received by virtue of this act (a supplement to the act for the preservation of the breed of fish) under the penalty of 50l. current money. Nov. 1792, c. 73, § 4.

20. Every person appointed a justice of the peace, as such shall have the same power and jurisdiction as any justice of any county court now hath by law out of court; and the justices of the peace appointed for any county, or any five or more of them, shall meet at the court-house of their county, at the time appointed by law for laying their county assessment, and they are hereby required then and there to lay the assessment of their county as heretofore, and the clerk of their county shall attend them for that purpose; and the said justices of the peace shall and they are hereby required to perform and execute, in their respective counties, all the duties and offices committed to the county courts by the law for the inspection of tobacco; and each of the said justices of the peace shall have and receive at the rate of 2 dollars a day while attending on the public service aforesaid, to be assessed in their county assessment. 1796, c. 43, § 16.
