

who shall wager on such race, or run for his diversion, or ride a race on any horse, &c. belonging to any other, recoverable in any court of record by action of debt, &c. and to be applied, half to the informer, and half to the county school. 1747, c. 17, § 2, 7.

6. The constables of their several hundreds in the said counties, (on their own knowledge, or information of others; that great numbers of slaves, during such meetings, are met in a tumultuous-manner, within the said counties,) shall immediately repair to the place, with necessary assistance, and command them immediately to disperse, &c. which, if any of them shall refuse or delay to do, or behave impudently, &c, such constables shall seize and correct the offenders by whipping, not exceeding 39 stripes.—*ibid.* § 8.

7. Persons selling, disposing of, or exposing to sale, any strong or spirituous liquors, at or near any public road, or any place whatsoever, within three miles of the meeting houses in Talbot and Anne Arundel counties, during the days on which the yearly meetings of the quakers are held, shall, for every such offence, forfeit 5l. current money, one half to the informer, the other to the county school.—1752, c. 14, § 2.

8. But this act shall not preclude any licenced ordinary keeper, merchant, or other person residing in the said counties, from selling such liquors at their dwelling-houses, during such meetings, so as such liquors (except what is sold by licenced ordinary-keepers) be not drank at the place where sold.—*ibid.* § 3.

9. The leave of the legislature is granted to the quakers to enjoy for ever the use of certain land in East Nottingham and West Nottingham, provided the chancellor, shall find facts stated to be true; and he may direct a patent of the same to certain persons, and their heirs, to hold the same in trust for ever, to the use of the said society, according to the intention of the original patent for 40 acres in East Nottingham, and of the grant, licence or warrant, for taking up 5 acres and 112 perches in West Nottingham; saving to all persons, and bodies politic or corporate, their respective rights.—1791, c. 17, § 2.

10. The trustees of the society of quakers shall have and hold a lot of ground on the east side of Jones's falls, included within York, Harford, and Pitt streets, and Smock alley, containing near 4 acres, and a small piece of said lot to accommodate a schoolmaster, their heirs and assigns for ever, saving to all and every person their respective rights to be held and enjoyed for a meeting house, yard, stabling, burying ground, school house, and dwelling house and small garden, to accommodate said schoolmaster, or person taking care of said property. 1793, c. 20.
