

the east side of William Bateman's house, and on the north side of a line drawn from the riding-over of the said branch to the head of a branch of a creek issuing out of the bay, called Churne creek, be always taken, reputed and be in Shrewsbury parish; and that all the land on the south side of the said Churne creek and branch and division line, down the bay to the extent of Cæcil county, be added to St. Paul's parish, in Kent county, on the north side of Chester river, and always to be reputed, taken and be in St. Paul's parish, any law, custom or usage to the contrary notwithstanding.

V.

II. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, by the authority aforesaid, by and with the advice and consent aforesaid, That Mr. Michael Miller, of Kent county, gentleman, and captain Edward Blay, of Cæcil county, be present with Symon Willmor, surveyor of the said county, at the running and making of the division line, and that they return the survey, and a fair demonstration of the division line, which is to be lined out by a line of marked trees, as well under the hands and seals of the said Mr. Michael Miller and captain Edward Blay, as the said Symon Willmor, unto his excellency the governor, by the tenth day of June aforesaid; and whereas the division of the said parishes are thought, very convenient to both the said parishes, therefore the charges and expences of the division of the said parishes is to be equally paid by the said parishes of St. Paul's and Shrewsbury.

C H A P. X.

An ACT for the naturalization of Peter Dowdee, a Frenchman, living in Somerfet county. Lib. LL. No. 2. fol. 159. A Private Act.

C H A P. XI.

An ACT empowering the commissioners of Cæcil county to hold a court this present year in April. Lib. LL. No. 2. fol. 165.

C H A P. XII.

An ACT for deciding differences between masters and servants. Repealed.

C H A P. XIII.

An ACT ascertaining the bounds and limits of Anne-Arundel and Baltimore counties. Lib. LL. No. 2. fol. 157.

Viz. According to a division made by certain commissioners in pursuance of an ordinance of assembly anno 1696, in manner following: Beginning at three marked trees, viz. a white oak, a red oak, and a chefnut tree, standing about a mile and a quarter to the southward of Bodkin creek, on the west side of Chesapeake bay; the marked red oak on the right hand for Baltimore county, the chefnut tree on the left hand for Anne-Arundel, the white oak in the middle: They standing near a marsh and a pond, and running thence west, until it cross the road from the mountains of the mouth of Magothy river, to Richard Beard's mill; then continuing westward, with the said road to William Hawkin's path, to two marked trees, the one for Anne-Arundel county, the other for Baltimore county; thence continuing along the said road to John Locker's path, to two trees, for the end and purposes aforesaid; then leaving the road, by a line drawn west to William Slade's path, to two marked trees as aforesaid; thence continuing west, between the draughts of Magothy and Patapsco rivers, until it come to a mountain of white stone rock, still continuing west to a road going to Patapsco, to Peter Bond's, to two marked trees as aforesaid; thence continuing west to the main road to Patapsco ferry, to two marked pines, standing near the Ready Branch, written at large, on the north side of the said trees, Baltimore county, on the south side Anne-Arundel county; from thence, with a line drawn W. N. W. to Elk-ridge road, to two marked trees, for the end and purposes aforesaid; thence continuing the same course of W. N. W. to Patuxent river, and so up the said river to the extent thereof, for the bounds of Baltimore county. All that tract of land lying on the north side of the said division lines, &c. to be in Baltimore county, and all the land, &c. on the south side thereof to the antient extent of Anne-Arundel county, to be in Anne-Arundel county, &c.

N.B. So far of this act as relates to the south side of Patapsco river being added to Baltimore county, is repealed by the act of 1726, ch. 1.
