IV. AND BE IT ENACTED, That any person or persons who shall fish any such wear or hedge, al- Penalty on sulli-ready erected, or which shall hereafter be erected, so as to obstruct or injure the navigation in the said ing, &c. eastern or north-west branch of the said river Patowmack, shall forfeit and pay for every such offence the fum of three pounds current money, to be recovered and applied as herein before directed.

V. AND BELIT ENACTED, That all wears and hedges already made, or hereafter to be made, Wears not to upon the water above the town of Bladensburg, so as to obstruct the natural course of the said water, be erested above Bladensburg, shall be deemed and bove Bladensburg, shall be deemed and burg, sec. taken to be nuisances, and may be abated as such; and any person making, erecting or fishing; such hedge or wear, after the first day of April next, shall forseit for every such offence the sum of fivepounds current money, to be recovered and applied as aforefaid.

WHEREAS the commissioners of Queen-Anne's county, appointed to fell the court-house and Preamble. prison, with the public grounds, at Queen's-town, cannot sell or dispose of the same without previously fettling the bounds thereof; therefore,

II. BE IT ENACTED, by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the commissioners of Queen-Anne's Public grounds county for laying off the public grounds on Corfica creek, and for felling the public property at to be laid off, &c. Queen's town, be and they are hereby authorifed and empowered to lay off the public ground at &c. Queen's town, and make a plot of the same, and to take and reduce to writing all evidence and proof to the bounds and location of the faid ground, and the fame, with the plot by them made, to record among the records of Queen-Anne's county, in perpetual memory of the faid bounds and location.

H A P. XVIII.

A Bill, entitled, An act for underpinning and arching the court-house of Baltimore county, in Baltimore-town, and the extension of Calvert-street. Lib. TBH. No. A. fol. 405.

WHEREAS it is represented to this general assembly, that the court-house in the town of Bal- Preamble timore, by its position on a hill about twenty feet above the pitch of Calcort from timore, by its polition on a hill about twenty feet above the pitch of Calvert-street, and by croffing the ftreet in a due east and west course, checks the town both in its growth and prosperity, inasmuch as the extent of Calvert-street is limitted by the court-house, and all direct intercourse with the country thereby prevented: And whereas it is represented, that the said court-house, by being underpinned and arched; that is to fay, by three arches added to the building on the fouth side, and an equal number of corresponding arches on the north side, the centre arches to be twentyeight feet in the clear and eighteen feet high, the others fix feet in the clear and twelve feet high, or thereabout, would thereby open a direct communication with the country, and permit the pitch Pppp
