And BE IT ENACTED, That all commodities of the produce of either of the faid states, or Certain comof the western country, which may be carried or transported through the faid locks, canals and river, modities free may be landed, fold, or otherwise disposed of free from any other duties, impositions, regulations or from duty, &c. may be landed, fold; or otherwise disposed of, free from any other duties, impositions, regulations or restrictions, of any kind, than the like commodities of the produce of the state in which the same may happen to be so landed, fold, shipped or disposed of.

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XX. And, to encourage and promote the faid undertaking, Be it ENACTED, That if the flate of State to Sub-Virginia shall subscribe fifty shares, in such case the treasurer of the western shore be authorised and sende, &c. directed to subscribe, in behalf of this state, a like number of shares, and the money necessary to be paid in consequence of such subscription, shall be paid by this state; and the treasurer of the western fliore for the time being shall have a right to vote according to fuch shares, in person, or by proxy appointed by him; and the faid treasurer shall receive the proportion of the tolls aforesaid, which shall, from to time, be due to the state for the shares aforesaid.

By 1795, ch. 51, the treasurer of the western shore is directed to subscribe, in behalf of the state, forty shares in the augmented capital of the Patowmack company, and is to have a right to vote, &c. but not till the president shall notify to him, in writing, that the whole of the residue of the said shares are subscribed for; the payments to be made at the times and in the proportion required of the individual flockholders. And by 1795, ch. 69, unless the president and directors shall dispose of fixty thares of the augmented capital for 3. 160 serious each, they shall have no authority to receive from the treasurer a subscription for any part thereof, nor for any payment, but in proportion as the other subscribers shall pay, nor till the president and directors shall certify to the treasurer that the preceding instalments have been paid on every share of the said augmented capital.
