a pilot to conduct or pilot his vellet, and shall continue the same pilot to the capes, or pay half pilotage to the capes to the first applicant; and the master of every yellel having no pilot on board, who shall follow another wellel that has a pilot on board, hall pay him half pilotage; and every pilot shall be exempt from militia duty during the time he shall act as pilots.

By 1790, ch. 27, all veffels belonging to perfons not citizens of any of the United States arriving from fea at any port in this flate, shall be obliged to take a pilot; if one offers, and pay one third additional pilotage above the fees allowed. The same fees 41 to be paid on the results of the commander to take the pilot.

XI. AND BE IT ENACTED, That every pilot cruifing or standing out to fea, shall offer his services Pilot to offer first to the vesselles nearest the land or in most distress; under the penalty of twenty pounds current first to the vesselles and it any pounds current first to the vesselles of the land of the penalty of the land, fel nearest land, money; and if any pilot, not being hindered by fickness or other lawful cause; shall refuse to go on &c. board any vellel, when required by the malter, to execute his office; such pilot shall forfeit and pay fifty pounds current money; and in either cafe, upon complaint and conviction before the board of examiners; luch pilot fliall be liable to be fuspended by them for such time as they siall think sit; and every pilot, on offering his fervices to the mafter of any vellel, shall produce and shew to such master his warrant of appointment and licence granted him in virtue of this act, under the penalty of five pounds current money for every neglect.

XII. And BE IT ENACTED, That if any pilot shall negligently or carelessly lose any vessel under Penalty for nehis care, and be thereof convicted by due course of law, he shall for ever after such conviction be gligence, &c. incapable of acting as a pilot in this state, and shall be also liable by action at common law to pay all fuch damages as any person shall sustain by such negligence or carelessness; and if any pilot shall run any vessel on shore; he shall be entitled to no pilotage, and if by negligence, he shall also be liable by action at common law to pay all damages occasioned thereby.

XIII. And, for preventing exorbitant: demands for pilotage, Be it enacted, That no greater Rates of pilot. reward for pilotage shall be taken than is allowed by this act, to wit: For every vessel from the capes age, &c. to Baltimore-town, eight shillings and nine-pence current money, and from Baltimore-town to the capes, eleven shillings and fix-pence current money, for every half foot of water which such vessel hall draw; and from the mouth of Patowmack (a) to George-town, and vice versa, there shall be an addition of one lifth to the above sums, and so in proportion for any less distance from any other port of this state to the capes, or from the capes to any other port of this state, such distance to be afcertained by the faid board of examiners; but no pilot shall receive any reward for any supernumerary inches under fix.

(a) By 1790, ch. 27, one fifth added to the pilotage from the capes to Baltimore shall be considered as the full pilotage from the capes to George town, and fo in proportion for any lefs diffance.

XIV: AND BE IT ENACTED, That if any vessel bound to sea, or to any of the ports within this Allowance for state; and under the direction of a pilot appointed under this act, shall touch at Hampton road, and vessels touching from any other cause than distress of weather, the faid pilot may demand and receive from the master road, &c. of fuch vessel the sum of thirty shillings current money for carrying in any such vessel, and for bringing her out again the fum of twenty hillings current money; and if any vessel bound to sea, or any of the ports above or below the mouth of Severn, shall touch at the port of Annapolis, for any other cause than distress of weather, the pilot may demand and receive from the master thereof the sum of ten shillings for every day he is detained with such vessel.

XV. AND, to the end that strangers may not be imposed on in the rates of pilotage, as settled by this act, BE-IT-ENACTED, That every pilot appointed in pursuance of this act, shall be obliged, Pilot to prowhen he receives his pilotage, to produce a copy of this act to the master of the vessel, to shew that duce a copy of he demands no greater reward than is allowed by this act; and if any pilot shall neglect to shew such this act, &c. copy at the time of receiving his pilotage, he shall forfeit and pay five pounds current money, and it he shall refule; on request, to produce such copy, he shall forfeit and pay twenty pounds current money.

XVI. And BE IT ENACTED, That if any mafter of any vessel shall carry any licensed pilot to sea Wages allowed against his inclination, such master shall pay to a first rate pilot seven pounds ten stillings current to pilots carried money per month, if his boat be with him, if not, five pounds per month, until his return or death; to lea, &c. to a fecond rate pilot fix pounds per month, if his boat be with him, if not, four pounds per month, until his return or death; to a third rate pilot five pounds per month, if his boat be with him, if not, three pounds per month, until his return or death; and if any master of any vessel shall carry any licenfed pilot to fea against his inclination, when his boat or any other boat is ready and offers
