

CHAP. I.X.
Part of two acts repealed.

III. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That so much of the act of assembly, (a) entitled, An act appointing wardens for the port of Baltimore-town, in Baltimore county, which empowers the said board of wardens to assess and levy a duty of one penny per tun on every vessel entering or clearing at the said port; and also so much of another act of assembly, (b) entitled, A supplement to the act, entitled, An act appointing wardens for the port of Baltimore-town, in Baltimore county, which empowers the board of wardens to assess, levy and collect, on every vessel arriving at the said port of Baltimore, except pilot boats and vessels not coming from sea belonging to citizens of this state, a sum not exceeding two-pence current money per tun, be and are hereby repealed.

By 1796, ch. 68, the powers given by this and other acts are transferred to the corporation of the city of Baltimore.

Proviso.

IV. PROVIDED ALWAYS, That this act of assembly shall not operate and take effect until the same be ratified and confirmed by an act of the congress of the United States.

This act was ratified and confirmed by an act of the first session of the fourth congress, ch. 26, passed the 12th of May, 1796, to continue for three years, and to the end of the next session of congress thereafter; and further continued by an act passed 17th March, 1800, till the 3d of March, 1803.

CHAP. LXI.

An additional supplementary act to an act, * entitled, An act to regulate the inspection of tobacco. Lib. JG. No. 1. fol. 464.

Preamble.

WHEREAS in some of the counties of this state the inspectors of tobacco settle their accounts with the levy courts which happen before November, and before the bulk of the tobacco of the inspection of each year is shipped off, by which means the inspectors retain considerable sums of public money in their hands longer than necessary; to remedy which,

Inspectors to settle annually, &c.

II. BE IT ENACTED, by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the inspectors of tobacco in each county of this state on the western shore, except Harford, Calvert and Saint-Mary's counties, who are now directed by law to settle their accounts before November, shall settle the same with the levy court on the fourth Tuesday in November annually, and that the levy courts in each county as aforesaid shall adjourn to the fourth Tuesday in November in each year, to settle with the said inspectors.

By 1795, ch. 71, so much of this act as relates to the adjournment of the levy court of Montgomery county was repealed, and the inspectors directed to settle their accounts with the said county on the fourth Monday in December in each year.

CHAP. LXII.

A Supplement to the act, * entitled, An act directing the time, places and manner, of holding elections for representatives of this state in the congress of the United States, and for appointing electors on the part of this state for choosing a president and vice-president of the United States; and for the regulation of the said elections, and also to repeal the act of assembly therein mentioned. Lib. JG. No. 1. fol. 465.

State divided into districts for nine members.

BE IT ENACTED, by the General Assembly of Maryland, That provided this state should be entitled to nine members in the next house of representatives of the United States, then and in that case it shall be and is hereby divided into eight districts, in the following order, to wit: Saint-Mary's, Charles and Calvert counties, shall be the first; Prince-George's and Anne-Arundel counties, including the city of Annapolis, the second; Montgomery county, and that part of Frederick county adjacent, as far as Monocacy, from the mouth thereof to the Pennsylvania line, the third; the remainder of Frederick county, Washington and Allegany counties, the fourth; Baltimore-town, (c) and Baltimore and Harford counties, the fifth; Cecil, Kent and Queen-Anne's counties, the sixth; Caroline, Talbot and Dorchester counties, the seventh; and Somerset and Worcester counties, the eighth, districts.

(c) By 1798, ch. 111, the mayor and city council of Baltimore are made judges of the elections therein instead of the commissioners.

And for eight members.

II. AND BE IT ENACTED, That provided this state should be entitled to no more than eight members as aforesaid, then and in that case it shall be and is hereby divided into eight districts, to wit: The first four shall remain as in the preceding clause; Baltimore-town and Baltimore county shall be the
