for the faithful payment in the first place of all expences incurred in conducting the said lottery, and the payment of all the fortunate adventurers therein, and for the faithful payment and application of all monies by them or any of them received in the execution of the authority above communicated, to such objects and purposes as by this act are prescribed, which bond shall be lodged in the general court, and there recorded, and upon such bond, or an office copy thereof, suit or suits may be instituted against the obligors therein, or any of them, or their or any of their legal representatives, for any breach of or non-compliance with the condition of the same:

V. AND BE IT ENACTED, That the product and produce of the said lottery, after first paying the expences of drawing the same, and the fortunate adventurers, shall be paid, within four months after the drawing of the said lottery, into the hands of Ephraim Blaine, Robert Whitehill and John Bratton, of Pennsylvania, and George Gale and Samuel Hughes, of the state of Maryland, who shall give bond to the state of Maryland, in the penalty of forty thousand pounds current money, before they shall receive the same, before the chief judge, or one of the associate justices, of Harford county, whose duty it shall be to lodge the said bond in the office of the general court of the western shore, to be there recorded and safely kept, and which bond shall be conditioned to be void if the said Ephraim Blaine, Robert Whitehill, John Bratton, George Gale and Samuel Hughes, or a majority of them, shall faithfully apply the said money towards the opening the navigation of the bed of the said river, in such manner as they shall think most expedient, and that no part thereof shall be applied to the opening or improving the canal of the proprietors of the Susquehanna canal.

Preamble.

WHEREAS the lands belonging to the free-school of Anne-Arundel county are lying waste and unemployed: And whereas for want of the funds formerly appropriated to the benefit of the said school, the visitors thereof have, for many years, been unable to employ a master to carry on the said school, according to the liberal intention of its founders: And whereas all of the visitors, except one, who were appointed in pursuance of the law by which the said school was established, are now dead: And whereas doubts are entertained whether the surviving visitor can elect others who can be qualified agreeably to the provisions of the original act;

II. BE IT ENACTED, by the General Assembly of Maryland, That Richard Harwood, William Hall, the third, Jonathan Sellman, Brice John Worthington, Henry Hall, Leonard Sellman and Richard Hall, shall be and they are hereby appointed visitors of the said school, and as such are hereby constituted a body politic, in the same manner, upon the same terms, and with all and every the rights, privileges, powers and immunities whatsoever, that were vested in the visitors of the said school by the original act, and the supplement thereto.

Who shall take  
an oath, &c.

III. AND BE IT ENACTED, That no person shall act as visitor of the said school, before he shall take the oath of fidelity and support to this state, required by the constitution or by the laws of this state, and the following oath, to wit: "I, A. B. do swear, that I will duly and faithfully discharge the duties and trusts committed to me as a visitor of Anne-Arundel county school, according to the best of my knowledge; so help me GOD."

Rent out the  
lands, &c.

IV. AND BE IT ENACTED, That the visitors of the said school, or a major part of them, shall have full power and authority either to rent out to the best advantage, for such term of years as they or a majority of them may think proper, the lands belonging to the said school, for the purpose of raising a fund to enable the visitors thereof to employ a master to carry on the said school, or to employ a master who will, for the use and occupation of the said lands, undertake to teach in the said school upon the same terms and conditions as are required by the original act, and the supplement thereto.

V. AND
