

V. AND BE IT ENACTED, That if the said visitors, or a majority of them, shall think it most to the advantage of the said school to rent out the lands belonging thereto, that then and in that case the money arising therefrom shall be annually paid to the said visitors, and shall be by them, for the benefit of the said school, annually vested in stock of the United States bearing an immediate interest of six per centum, and that the interest arising from the said stock shall be by the said visitors converted into a principal of the said stock, until the expiration of the time for which the said lands shall be rented, at which time the said visitors, or a majority of them, shall employ a master to teach in the said school upon the same terms and conditions as are required by the original act, and the supplement thereto.

C H A P. LXVI.
And vest the money in stock, &c.

VI. AND BE IT ENACTED, That if the said lands shall be farmed out by the said visitors, it shall not be lawful for any tenant or tenants to cut down any wood on the said lands more than what shall be absolutely necessary for firewood, and the repairing of the houses and fencing thereon.

Tenants not to cut down wood, &c.

VII. AND BE IT ENACTED, That the said visitors, and their successors for ever, in conducting and managing the said school, shall have and observe all the rights, privileges, powers, immunities and duties whatsoever, granted and imposed by the original act, and the supplement thereto, save only such as are annulled by the force and operation of this act.

BE IT ENACTED, by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the act of assembly, entitled, An act to compel the attendance of the members of the general assembly, passed at a session of assembly held at the city of Annapolis on the third day of November, in the year of our Lord seventeen hundred and ninety-four, * be and the same is hereby repealed.

BE IT ENACTED, by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the judge of the land-office for the eastern shore, to be appointed by the governor and council in pursuance of the act, * entitled, An act respecting certificates of surveys made on the eastern shore, shall be and he is hereby entitled to receive the sum of one hundred and fifty pounds current money per annum, during his continuance in office, to be paid by the treasurer of the eastern shore in quarterly payments out of any unappropriated monies remaining in said treasury.

C H A P. LXXI.

BE IT ENACTED, by the General Assembly of Maryland, That any three or more of the justices of the peace of the several counties in this state, except Washington, Frederick, Cecil, Caroline, Harford and Allegany, be and they are hereby authorized and required, annually, at the time and place of nominating inspectors, agreeably to the directions of the act to regulate the inspection of tobacco, and the supplementary acts thereto, to determine at what place or places on navigable water in their respective counties warehouses shall be kept for the reception and inspection of tobacco, agreeably to the said acts, and the number of inspectors proper at each place, and they shall enter the places, and number of inspectors at each place, in a book to be provided and kept for that purpose only; and in case the said justices should think proper to discontinue any warehouse in their respective
