V. AND BE IT ENACTED. That if the faid vilitors, or a majority of them, shall think it most to the advantage of the faid school to rent out the lands belonging thereto, that then and in that case the money arising therefrom shall be annually paid to the said visitors, and shall be by them, for the money in stock, benefit of the faid school, annually vested in stock of the United States bearing an immediate interest &c. of fix per centum, and that the interest arising from the said stock shall be by the said visitors converted into a principal of the faid flock, until the expiration of the time for which the faid lands shall be rented, at which time the faid vilitors, or a majority of them, shall employ a master to teach in the faid school upon the same terms and conditions as are required by the original act, and the supplement thereto.

CHAP. And vest the

VI. AND BE IT ENACTED, That if the faid lands shall be farmed out by the faid visitors, it shall Tenants not to not be lawful for any tenant or tenants to cut down any wood on the faid lands more than what shall cut down be absolutely necessary for firewood, and the repairing of the houses and sencing thereon.

VII. AND BE IT ENACTED, That the faid visitors, and their successors for ever, in conducting Visitors to have and managing the faid school, shall have and observe all the rights, privileges, powers, immunities certain rights, and duties whatfoever, granted and imposed by the original act, and the supplement thereto, save only fuch as are annulled by the force and operation of this act.

BE IT ENACTED, by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the judge of the land-office for the Judge's salary. eastern shore, to be appointed by the governor and council in pursuance of the act, * entitled, Chapter 61. An act respecting certificates of surveys made on the eastern shore, shall be and he is hereby entitled to receive the fum of one hundred and fifty pounds current money per annum, during his continuance in office, to be paid by the treasurer of the eastern shore in quarterly payments out of any unappropriated monies remaining in faid treasury.
