AND BE IT ENACTED, That the faid fecurities, and the furvivors of them, shall have the Commission al. fame commission on the collection aforefaid, as the faid theriff would have been entitled to, and that lowed all arrearages collected in virtue of this act shall be fairly applied to the discharge of the sums due by the focurities for the respective years, in which the faid arrearages ought by law to have been

And BE IT ENACTED; That nothing in this act contained shall be construed to take away or Not to take adeprive the respective debtors for taxes, other public dues and officers fees, of the same remedies way remedies, which they had against the original sheriff and collector, in cases where nothing is alleged to be due, or the diffress or execution are illegally conducted, but the same shall exist in full force and virtue against the said securities, and each of them.

An ACT for establishing a company for opening and extending the Passed 30th of navigation of the river Pocomoke. Lib. JG. No. 2. fol. 428.

HEREAS the extension of the navigation of Rocomoke river from Snow Hill to Mitchell's Preamble. Bridge, and also as far as the division line of the states of Maryland and Delaware, will be of great public utility, and many persons are willing to subscribe large sums of money to effect so laudable and beneficial a work, and it being just and proper that they, their heirs and assigns, should he empowered to receive, by way of toll, satisfaction for the money advanced by them in carrying the work into execution; and the risk they run; therefore,

Princels-Anne-town, Snow Hill-town, Elkton, Centre-Ville, Salisbury, Denton, and a place called The Trap, in Worcester county, for receiving and entering subscriptions for the said undertaking, under the management of David M'Mechen, Alexander M'Kim and Thorowgood Smith, or either of them, at Baltimore-town; Benjamin Harwood and James Thomas, or either of them, at the city of Annapolis; William Hammond Dorsey, Gustavus Scott: and Daniel Reintzel, or either of them, at George-town; David Kerr and John Erskine, or either of them, at Easton; William Barroll and William Spencer, or either of them, at Chester-town; Josiah Bayley and William Bond Martin, or either of them, at Cambridge; William Done and Ezekiel Haynie, or either of them, at Princess-Anne-town; Samuel Handy and Levin Handy, or either of them, at Snow Hill-town; Lemuel Purnell and William H.
