An ACT to allow further time for collecting the balances due Thomas O'Bryon, late sheriff and collector of Queen-Anne's county,

THEREAS by an act of assembly, passed at November session, seventeen hundred and ninety- Preamble. fix, Matthew Hawkins, James O'Bryon, David Lindsey, William Clayton, Edward Wright, John King Downes, Henry Pratt, Robert Waters and William Diamond, Securities of Thomas O'Bryon, a former theriff of Queen-Anne's county, were authorifed to collect, on or before the first day of January, seventeen hundred and ninety-eight, all balances due to the said Thomas O'Bryon as sheriff and collector of the said county: And whereas it is represented to this general assembly, that owing to the late arrival of the laws, and some differences with the administrator as to the right of the faid fecurities to collect the fees due to the fheriff in his own right for fervices by him performed, they were unable to collect the aforefaid balances; and the faid administrator, by his petition to this legislature, having signified his consent that the right of collecting the fees so due to the faid sheriff for services by him performed should be given to the securities, with a power to apply the fame in just and fair proportions to the discharge of debts due from him in his private and public capacities; therefore,

II. BE IT ENACTED, by the General Assembly of Maryland, That Matthew Hawkins, James O'Bryon, Securities to executor of James, David Lindsey, William Clayton, Edward Wright, John K. Downes, Henry Pratt, Robert Waters and William Diamond, securities of Thomas O'Bryon aforesaid, or a majority of them, or the furvivors of them, be and they are hereby authorifed and empowered to collect, on or before the first day of January, seventeen hundred and ninety-nine, all balances owing as aforesaid to the said deceased sheriff and collector for the years seventeen hundred and ninety-two, seventeen hundred and ninety-three, and feventeen hundred and ninety-four, in manner following, to wit: That the aforefaid fecurities, or fuch person or persons as shall be deputed by them, or a majority of them, or the survivors of them, in the collection aforefaid, shall, at least thirty days before execution or distress of property for the arrearages aforesaid, deliver to the person charged, or leave at his or her last place of abode, an account, stating the taxes and the amount of fees due to the state and the officers respectively, or such part thereof as may be claimed as due, and the said securities, or a majority of them, or their agent, shall, if they be thereto required by the person so charged, make oath, before a justice of the peace, that the faid account was taken fairly and truly from the books or papers of the faid Thomas O'Bryon, and that it doth not appear from the faid books or papers, or by any memorandum of the faid Thomas O'Bryon, that any part or parcel of the charges contained in such account hath been paid, or otherwise secured or satisfied; and if the person or perfors owing fuch taxes and officers fees shall neglect or refuse to pay the same, it shall and may be lawful for the faid fecurities, or a majority of them, or the furvivors of them, to collect the same by execution, or diffress of property of the person or persons so resuling or neglecting, and to sell and dispose thereof, at public auction, at the expiration of ten days, exclusive of the day of seizure and day of fale, on giving ten days notice, by advertisement at the most public places of the neighbourhood, and at the court-house cloor of the county, of the day and hour of falc.

III. And he it enacted, That all the books, memorandums and entries, of the faid sheriss and Books, &c. to his deputies, in which his accounts as flieriff and collector are stated and kept, shall be delivered by &c. James O'Bryon, junior, his administrator, to the faid securities, or a majority of them, on demand, and shall be deposited in the hands of John Caradine, or such person as the securities may direct, in Centre-Ville, to be freely inspected and examined, without cost or charges, by any person or persons who shall apply for that purpose, in order to ascertain any payments that may have been made upon his, her or their account; and the faid James O'Bryon, junior, before he shall deliver the said books, memorandums and entries, to the faid fecurities, or a majority of them, shall make oath, before a
