

The hon<sup>th</sup> Cecilius Calvert Esq<sup>r</sup> his Lordships

Sir.

I doubt not but you have received before  
 this time my Letter to you of the 24<sup>th</sup> of December  
 last with my Commission as Secretary of the Province  
 under the Appointment of the Lord Proprietary and his  
 Guardians; which authorizes my Correspondence with  
 you on my Nephews Concerns in general under such  
 capacity. And as the Boundaries between Maryland  
 and Pensilvania are of so great Importance to my Nephew  
 I make that the chief of subject of this Letter.

Maryland in the Kings Charter the 20<sup>th</sup> of Juny  
 1632 is thus described viz<sup>t</sup> "That of a Peninsula  
 " bying in the " America between the Ocean  
 " of Chesopeak on the west,  
 " part thereof by a right line  
 " and called Watkins Point sit-  
 " near the River Wighes  
 " Ocean on the East, between
