

Lieutenant Governor's death fallen into Mr. Tasker's hands,
 as also another to the late Lieutenant Governor from Mr. S. per
 one of his Lordships Guardians on the same subject. —
 Indeed by the Lieutenant Governor's letter to me of the
 30th of March last, I have had no suspicion but that he
 had inform'd you both as to my appointment as Secretary,
 and your Concernment as to your share of Recompence
 to me out of the Land Offices, as being at the head of the
 said Offices. — I have received a Letter from Mr. George
 Stuart under you in the office who seems to be apprised of
 My Lord's & Mr. S. — per favour to me, and says, he has
 the Honour to hold a share of the office, whereby a third part
 is to be satisfied by him, and the other two thirds by Mr
 Young, who he does not doubt but he has done it; That his
 may be paid to me without Trouble, he has desired the favour
 of Mr. Harbury to wait on me with his Proposition which is
 £33. 6. 8. Now as this is separating My Lord's and Mr. S. per
 favour to me contrary to their Intention and my Desire
 in holding Correspondence with others for such Purpose, If
 there is any such Division as to Persons under you in your
 office for the Completion of My Lord's and Mr. S. per favour;
 I must desire you will settle that matter with such Person
 holding with or under you as you think most proper. It is
 from you I expect the full satisfaction of My Lord's and Mr.
 S. per favour, which is £100. a Year, and as by Mr. Stuart's
 Letter was the annual salary thereout payable to the Secretary
 in England; but if not, My Lord's and Mr. S. per Letter desired it
 and in which I shall not think but of your compliance there
 to according to the date of my Commission, which is the 1st
 of August 1757. and their respective Letters of and concerning
 the same; which by the Returns of the Ships I hope for your answer,
 and Remittance of the £100. which will be due the 1st of next
 month, and a half yearly remittances afterwards on your Corre-
 spondent at London.
