

"Delaware River from 12 miles Distance Northwards of
 "Newcastle Town unto the three and fortieth Degree of
 "Northern Latitude if the said River doth extend so far
 "Northwards but if the said River shall not extend so far
 "Northward then by the said River so far as it doth extend
 "and from the Head of the said River the Eastern Bounds
 "were to be determined by a meridian Line to be drawn from
 "the Head of the said River unto the said 43^d Degree the
 "said Lands to extend westwards 5 Degrees in Longitude
 "to be computed from the said Eastern Bounds and the said
 "Lands to be bounded on the North by the beginning of the
 "43^d Degree of Northern Latitude and on the South by
 "a Circle drawn at 12 Miles distance from Newcastle
 "Northwards and Westwards unto the beginning of the 40th
 "Degree of Northern Latitude and then by a straight
 "Line Westwards to the Limit of Longitude above mentioned
 That the said Lord Baltimore the Grantee of the said
 Province of Maryland and the succeeding Proprietors thereof
 =of did as your Petitioners are well informed from Time
 to time expend Great sums of Money in settling the
 said Province and in bringing the cultivation of To-
 bacco to perfection there, whereby the Trade and
 Revenue of this Kingdom have gained and still
 daily receive very great Augmentations.

But unfortunately for both Proprietors, from the
 Proprietary of the two Provinces, and for want of an
 early Division and Separation of the one from the other by
 certain Metes and Bounds Disputes arose between the
 said William the Grantee of Pennsylvania and Lord Baltimore
 the then Proprietor of Maryland and which has ever since sub-
 sisted touching the Boundarys of the said respective Provinces
 in respect to the Northern Boundary of Maryland (which by the
 said subsequent Grant to Pennsylvania was to make the Southern
 Limits
