 to frame Bills as may be mischievous to the Country, by
 Consolidating or Tacking them with the Inspection Law
 or other Laws in another Session. as you hint at. It is
 inconsistent for the Upper House to suffer such to pass,
 or the Representatives the Eyes of the People, be so dim-
 sighted as to suffer their constituents to be plunged in ruin,
 or that the Upper House will suffer the Essential part of
 Property to be subjected almost to a Dissolution. Therefore
 his Lordship & his Guardians trust all will be right; not
 Doubting your strict adherence to Mr. Farkerd's Administra-
 tion; as therin You will distinguish your self faithfully
 both to the Proprietary & to the good of the Province.
