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Capacity; as to the Memorial; he had waited on the Doctor
several Allegations. In short, he humbly & haud & his
answers were confused; that to what he said no Dependence
could be taken; and what passed after, was to the following
Effect. The Speaker insisted that he & the Doctor should
go on, & make out their charge, ~~as~~ as it contain'd matters
of such a nature & of so high Importance both to the
Proprietary & him, It being strictly his Inclination & Duty
to have it so, and Mr. Sharpe join'd him therein. The
Speaker hinted to him of his having appear'd under two
Capacities, vizt with the Doctor unknown to the Speaker,
and with the Speaker for his Friendship to My Lord, i.e. the
Government; as to the Doctor, he expected they would go on,
with their charge & Allegations; as to the Letter, he might
leave all Hopes of expecting that from him, to My Lord.
Mr. Bird replied, that the Doctor had used him exceedingly
ill, that he did not credit the affair and would have no
further concern therein; but the Speaker & Mr. Sharpe both
insisted he should continue to go on. And My Lord Proprietary
insists on the same. By this, you will strengthen me with such
further Evidence for Entirely clearing up and confuting all
the Doctors charge & Allegations; as it concerns the Reputation
of the late Administration of Government. Therefore it is the
Duty of all Persons concern'd to ~~clear~~ clear them selves of such
scandalous Imputations so highly reflecting on their Loyalty, the
Religion of the Church of England as by Law established, & their
Justice; which is the only way to acquit themselves to the
Present Lord Proprietary & to all men.

On the arrival of a Governor after My Lord comes of age
a new Commission from the Present Lord Proprietary will accom-
pany him for the Council of State; It being needful, sooner
as hinted in my last.
