The Order of Council You inclosed to me therein, I have advised with Mr. John Sharpe thereon, who says, it is needless to take notice thereof, as You succeeded to the Exercise of Government on the late Governour's Death, as first in Council in the Province.

My Lord Proprietary depends & does not doubt but you will comply with his Desires contain'd in my Letter of the 15<sup>th</sup> of May last to the late Governour Mr. Ogle, concerning the Reservations of Appointments from his Lordship in Church Prefement; and that you will perform every thing as was required by & in the said Letter

The Gentleman bearing Yours of the 15<sup>th</sup> of August (who has been very lately with me) I shall on your Recommendation introduce him to My Lord Proprietary; and on his obtaining Ecclesiastical orders, shall request of my Lord what you desire; whose willingness in favour thereof I am sensible there will not be the least doubt of.

Your Letter of the 24<sup>th</sup> of September inclosed me a Letter dated the 21<sup>st</sup> of the same month, two loose written Papers & a List of Bills Value £166. 3. 8<sup>cs</sup> payable to the present Lord Proprietary, and to his account. which Bills I have delivered to his Lordships Guardian & the late Lords Executors, the only property belonging to the present Lords Guardians.
