Dear 10th May old State Received the 26th of new style
 out of which we have drawn that upon the advice of M^r Hollingsworth you are
 come to the Island of Nathaniablettis for to examine the said outable murders done
 by the Saukianas Indians unto four English Men. (This being) forasmuch as
 Ralfe appeared to us that there have been four Persons out of the Province of
 Maryland which after two days stay departed from hence to their plantations
 as they said. and by the way are mette by the said Indians by whom they are
 murthered. And on M^r Carettos or the from Hillmett the two Indians coming
 from the Mequas Country, to one of them they did give a Hatch and nothing
 else to the other they gave nothing. The same two Indians came to the Town
 imagining nothing but the M^r Cutters which killed the Men did very secretly
 and speedily pass this place unto the River. Two or Three Inhabitants of New
 Anstall did in the mean while lay Hold on those two Indians. And for
 caused them to be brought to the Forte but after many Examinations found
 them not Guilty but that it was done by another Nation wherefore we have
 Releaved them, because the ignorant cannot suffer for the Guilty, otherwise
 it would be a Case ground of no reason besides there is sometime past
 between us and the Indians a difference
 whicheight Engage us with them to an open War, whereby the Cultture
 of the Country and the Advancement of the Colony would be much hindered
 in which apparently your Honour would take no Comfort nor Content
 with the two Indians which have not been actually in the Fact. And there-
 fore let your Honour be assured that the releasing of the two Indians hath
 not been done out of any ill Intent nor to the Prejudice of so good Christians our
 Neighbours in favour of the Heathens which have committed from time to time
 divers murtherers and Robberies upon our own nation also wishing that we
 could lay hold of this good opportunity in revenging our selves upon the
 M^r Cutters also to conclude your Honour may be confident that the shedding
 of Christian Blood is most detestable unto us assuring your self that we shall
 Contribut in all things to the preservation of friendship with neighbours
 of our Belief for as much as might be done without prejudice to our own
 Nation we Committo your Honour to Gods keeping who will quiet us &
 Bless us to your Government. So I Rest—
