be forbidden against the said Towne of New Amstel till such time as Letters from
his Lordship may again be had in answer of what hath been written to his
Lordship concerning this affair and that Observation may be taken at the
head of the bay of Chesapeake thereby to find certainly whether the said Towne
of New Amstel do lye within the fortyth degree of North latitude or not
and further that tryall be made whether assistance from Virginia may
be had and from New England for the recovery and Maintenance of
that Place against the Dutch &c

At the Court of the King of Buckingham in Delaware Bay -
Shewing that whereas there had been divers men slain by the
English belonging to the Casparouke Indians now under his Command
and amongst them his own brother in revenge of which divers English
had been slain by these Indians, yet that he did believe all those out-
rages were committed by the English without order from the Governour
and Council so he did assure the Governour and Council that these
revenges were taken by his Indians without his or any of his Great mens
knowledge therefore he did desire that all might be forgotten and that from
hence forward his Indians might live in Peace with the English
