20 Jan<sup>t</sup> Proclamation never published

By the Lieutenant General

Whereas I understand of divers jealousies and fears  
aroused in the Colony touching the Indians and the expecta-  
tion of a great plague and hindrance this year either  
in making a march upon them or in Goddining against  
them with the diminution of the people and the lossing  
of their usual diligence and activity..... by  
proceeding in their labours for the next crop for Remedy  
whereof and to let them see what consideration is had  
of their safety and of easing them of all things that may  
be of burthen..... be hinderance to  
them. I have thought fit to publish and declare hereby that  
all possible diligence is and shall be used to furnish the  
Country with Ammunition and that the Charge of what  
soever expeditors upon the Indians or our Guards for  
securing of the Frontiers to the end the Planters may  
attend their Labours in as great Security as ever heretofore  
shall be undertaken and defrayed by his Lordship and  
such other persons as shall be able or willing to contribute  
thereto without putting the Country to any further charge  
or trouble then the payns of the Soldiers to make the  
march or the Outwards and that the march shall be  
so laid (if any there be) as that it shall be no hinderance  
considerable to their loss that shall go upon it in the mean  
time all men are required hereby to take care of having their  
Guns fixed and all other things ready upon any sudden  
warning to make a march or otherwise be dispos'd of  
for the safety and service of the Country.
