This day the question was moved in Court whether or no Mr Leonard Calvert remaining his Lordship's sole attorney within this province before his death and then dying the said Mr Calvert's Administrator was to be received for his Lordship's Attorney within this prov' until such time as his Lordship had made a new substitution or that some other remaining upon the premises commission were arrived into the province the Governor demanding Mr Brants opinion upon the same. Quere he answered that he did conceive that the Administrator ought to be looked upon as Attorney both for recovering of rights into the estate and paying of due debts out of the Estate and taking care for the estates preservation but not further until his Lordship shall substitute some other as aforesaid and thereupon the Governor concurred and it was ordered that the Administration of Mr Leonard Calvert aforesaid should be receiv'd as his Lordship to the Intents aforesaid.

The Governor repealed the power which he formerly gave to Mr Brant for signing of writs and administering of Oaths.
