On ye 20th Being after, the President declared that ye people is fitting to adjourn,
ye people for a longer time; till ye laws w^t they would present to ye Lord
Proprietary were made ready, w^t but would take a care of, & in ye mean time
ye company might attend yeir other business &c.

Capt. Cornwallis replied they could not spend yeir time in any business better than
in fit for ye country's good: and one of ye planters demanded ye reason why it
should be adjourned, & said they were willing to leave yeir other business to attend it.

The President replied he would be accountable to no man for ye adjourning of it.

Then Capt. Cornwallis moved that at least a Committee might be appointed
that should take charge of preparing ye laws till ye people met again. And
Being put to ye people, they agreed yeir Committee should be appointed; ye
other and nominating fiscally of 3. Committees; the President had 46. votes,
Capt. Cornwallis had 56. votes; Capt. Edwin 44 votes; and George 31. votes.
and Snow had 5. votes; and Captain Fletcher 4. votes.

There was a demand that privilege of ye planters men for yeir yeobies should not
be allowed till ye next meeting of ye Assembly.

The President adjourned ye people till 1st of February.
