I sent a sample of the Maryland money with
directions for the procuring it to pass because
I understood by letters this year from the Go-
vernor and you and others that there was no
doubt but the people there would accept of it^{ch}.
if we find they do, there will be means found to
supply you all there with money enough: but
though it would be a very great advantage to the
Colony, that it should pass current there, and
an other discouragement for the future supply
of any more, if there be not a certain establish-
ment this year and assurance of its being voted
and current there. yet it must not be imposed
upon the people but by a law there made by
their Consents in a Generall Assembly, and
pray fail not to signify to the Governor and
Councill there & together from me by showing them
this letter from
