Another proclama-
 tion of the King.

Although it cannot way be doubted, but that his Ma^{ty}s
 Right and Tytle to his Crowne and Kingdom is and was
 every way compleat by the death of his most Royall fa-
 ther of glorious memory without the Ceremony or
 Solemnity of a Proclamation. Yet since Proclamations
 in such cases have bene always used to the end that
 all good Subjects might upon this occasion testify their
 duty and respects, And since the armed violence and other
 the calamities of these many years last past have kept
 to deprive us of any such opportunity wherein we
 might profess our loyalty and allegiance to his Ma^{ty} the
 therefore the Governour and Council of this Province of Mary-
 Land, and other his Ma^{ty}s loyal Subjects have presented
 By the special order and authority of the Right Hon^{ble} the
 Lord Proprietary of this Province, Do according to our duty
 and allegiance, heartily joyfully and unanimously acknow-
 ledge and proclaim, that immediately upon the death of our
 late Sovereign Lord King Charles the first great Secour
 of the Realm of England and of all the Kingdoms Domi-
 nions and Right belonging to the same by inheritance
 right, and lawfull and undoubted Succession descend and
 come to his Most Excellent Ma^{ty} Charles the second as being
 lawfully, justly and lawfully now borne of the blood Royall of
 this Realm, And that by the goodness and providence of All
 mighty God this is of England Scotland France and Ireland
 the Most potent Mighty and Undoubted King Defender of
 the faith &c, And therefore we most humbly and faithfully
 do submit, and oblige our selves our heirs and posterity
 In Ever Date the Nynthenth day of November 1660.
