

they doe intend to marry this Daughter of Wanny's family
whenever they shall arrive to mature years: Referring them-
selves to the Governor & Council of this Province, if he be
they shall judge it convenient, & approve thereof, & not con-
tradict them therein: To whose power they doe submit them-
selves.

Further they Request That this Youth (formerly called Nator-
waffo) be hereafter called Wahoaffo after his Father's
name.

Lastly they desire the Lieut. Gove to approve of & allow this
their Election of Natorwaffo, now Wahoaffo. And likewise
the English, will protect him upon all occasions.

To which last proposition the Lieut. Gove (by his Interpreter)
answered. That hee would both protect him & defend him.
And then charged the Indians that they should not presume
to wrong him upon any pretence, either by poisoning of
him, or by other indirect ways. Assuring them, That if
any such thing should happen, & be committed by them, hee
would (together with the Council of this Province) be very in-
quisitive concerning the same, & inflict condigne punishment
upon the offenders therein.

As to the other proposition concerning the uniting of those Two
families, the Lieut. Gove would say nothing at present. There being
time enough, before either of them be of mature age, to
discuss that Business.

To all the rest concerning Natorwaffo now called Wahoaffo
the Lieut. Gove gave his assent thereto. And hee was ac-
cepted of, & acknowledged as Emperor. After which some few In-
dian Ceremonies passed. And then the Lieut. Gove, and the
English departed.
