

52. No man shall presume to use any swearing or menacing words, Signs or gestures, where any of the aforesaid Courts of justice are sitting. Upon paine of suffering such punishment as the Court martiall shall think fit.

53. Whatever is to be published or generally made knowne shall be done by Boate of Drummes, or the sound of trumpetps or other publicke notice given, that so no man may pretend ignorance thereof, and after that whosoever shall be found dislodgement or faulty against what is thus published shall be punished according to these articles, or the quality of the fact.

Which said Articles of Warre were admitted by his Lordshipp and Council and Ordered that Copie thereof be sent to the respective Colonells within this Province to be published at the heads of their Companies and that every Colonell give Copie thereof to his respective Captaines to be published at the heads of their Companies, and that each respective Colonell satisfie and pay unto the Clerk of the Councell for the time being for the Copie of the said Articles the summe of foure hundred pounds of tobacco.

Jane Maquata King of Mattawanee gave the Lord Proprietary to be informed, that he was in great danger of being destroyed by the common Enemy, and therefore feared his owne life, if the Pennsylvanie Prisoner were sett at liberty; That the Matchoaticke Indians had a mind to come over to his shott and that he doth believe there will be many Indians (whether enemies or friends he knowes not but fears the worst) in his quarters ere long, and therefore desirous to know his Lords Appliance how he shall demeane himselfe towards them aforesay for his owne security and the security of the English.

And he further shewred that since his Llys was going for England.
