

England he feared that after his departure he should be forgotten by the English, and therefore prayed some care to be taken of him now which may stand him in stead in his Lordships absence.

And upon serious consideration had of the whole matter — Ordered by the Council his Lopp being present, that since it was agreed betwene his said Lopp and the said King and the other Kings that neither he nor any other should entertaine any Indians that should at any time come from Virginia. The said Pamunkey Indian prisoner shall be delivered up to the Virginians, w^{ch} a person violently suspected to have had his hand in blood on that J^o Potomack River — and the other three Indian prisoners be likewise delivered up to the Govern^t of Virginia, by them to be examined — and that the said Govern^t be given to understand that wee doe not deliver up those Indians (amongst which the King of Youcomack is one) w^{ch} persons that have had their hand in blood or any wayes deserve death, but to lett them see wee will not give the least encouragement to any Indians to come over into Our Government, by that means to take away all cause of Suspicion that wee endeavour to conceale any thing that may turne either to their good or Our owne Disquiet. —

And w^{ch} wee have no reason to suspect the King of Youcomack or his father or the Pascatoway Indian — So this Govern^t shall desire the Govern^t of Virginia to returne w^{ch} the said King of Youcomack and his father and the Pascatoway Indian, after they have examined them.

And forasmuch w^{ch} the Govern^t is very sensible of the danger the said King is in, and the advantage in point of security his preservation will be to us in Maryland It was further Ordered that twenty men well armed be provided for defence of the said King to be maintained at the charge of the Province under the Command of Capt Henry Affinall and (if the said King can find a house within the fort) to remaine in the fort, other wise to remaine at Capt Henry Affinalls ready to assist the said King upon all Occasions, according to such Orders & directions w^{ch} shall from time to time be sent to the said Affinall from his Lordships or his Governour and Council for the time being. —

And hereupon w^{ch} a mark of his Loppes Kindnesse and a pledge of freindship his said Lopp gave unto the King of Mattawoman, a medall with the figures of the R^oston^{er} Calibus his Loppes father lately deceased on the one side and the M^ony of Maryland on the other side with a blacke and yellow Ribbon. —
