At a Council held this day at Manahawicks Neck we have
considered the Overture of peace made by the Susquehannock
Indians and deeming it a blessing from God intended for
ever thought it not to be slighted, and therefore sent a posse
for them and Jacob Young the Interpreter to come do-

and returne safe from the treaty to be held at Martys at
conveniency ~~under~~ any time within one month, and we have this day affowritten
Treaty with Indians to Sir Wm Berkeley and the Council of Virginia to give him

Notice of this Overture of a peace made by the Indians and
to assure them that we shall not condescend to any peace
with them but what shall be equally safe and honourable

to our Government as to your Lord, deferring him
likewise to signify unto us within the month whether he hath
any thing in particular to offer at the Treaty In this
further my Lord your affairs stand now as do the Indians but
as to the English under Col^r Bracox they stand not so faire

we have just cause to suspect he intends to embroil y^e province
in a warre and that he will make the purſuit of the prefattaway
